

Color Magician To Give Illustrated Lecture On Sunday

Herbert Thompson Strong, the color magician who brought the hues of Bermuda sea water and of butterfly wings into everyday use in industry, will give an illustrated lecture on "Exploiting the Magic World of Color" at the Detroit Institute of Arts at 3:30 Sunday afternoon, November 29.

With a new and powerful projection machine that magnifies 200,000 times, Mr. Strong shows that the colors within a single drop of asparagus juice are more gorgeous than the aurora borealis. By means of ultra violet rays, he turns ordinary rocks into flaming jewels. He reveals iridescent colors, by special rays, that are beyond the range of unassisted human vision.

Mr. Strong is well known to Detroit automobile manufacturers, as he has designed special colors for automobiles and automobile fabrics for General Motors, Ford and Packard cars.

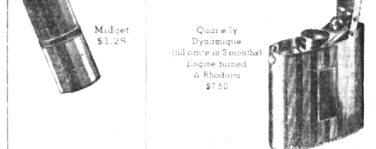
