With the 7 to 6 victory of last Saturday behind them the Houghton boys have renewed confidence in themselves and are all primed for a real battle with their downstate rivals Saturday.

MAPLES RALLY TO WIN, 18-13

Outplayed in First Half, Baldwin '11 Downs East Detroit

Outplayed during the first half, Baldwin High School, Maroon football squad rallied in the two closing periods of Saturday's game with East Detroit High and swept aside their opponents to win, 18-13. Victory for the Maroons was due to the brilliant offense, launched by the Maple "pony backfield," whose play leveled an otherwise listless game in which most of the Birmingham regulars failed to measure up to their usual standard.

Baldwin elected to kick off to open the first quarter and Forest, or hosted to East Detroit's 30 yard stripe. Two smashes at the line gained only a couple of yards, and then Lamponds, the visitor's fleet quarterback, swept to his right on a long end run, cut back through a broken field and galloped 60 yards for a touchdown, shaking off several would-be tacklers enroute. The Maroons stiffened and held the opponents at bay during the remainder of the initial period.

Early in the second quarter, East Detroit worked the oval deep within Maroon territory as the result of a short Baldwin High punt. A first down on off tackle plays, Lamponds sneaked around for ten yards to place the pigskin on Birmingham's 25 yard stripe and then Rapp, left end, snared a 20 yard pass from Fullback Foley and raced across the goal line for the visitor's second score. Lamponds faked a pass and plunged through the line for the extra point to make the score 13 to 0 in East Detroit's favor.

A bit disgusted at the listlessness of his first-string backs, coach Ernie Engel pulled them out of the fray and substituted the "pony backfield" quartet consisting of Whalen, O'Donald, Bernard Carey and Andrews. Taking to the air immediately, this fast, light secondary completed three passes in succession and carried the fight to the opponents. Each time a gain of 30 yards, the final have placing the ball on East Detroit's

4 yard marker. In their eagerness to push across a tally, the elusive midget backs failed to handle the ball cleanly and the visitors recovered a fumble near their goal line to change the rally and stop the Maroons' chance for a score in the first half.

The brilliant attack launched by the reserve backs seemed to be the tonic needed as the locals came back in the third quarter with plenty of pep and dash and assumed the offense. About the middle of the period Sevlario, who had gone in at fullback, broke into the clear on an off tackle thrust and sprinted 20 yards across the double line to give the Maples their first score. The try for extra point was wide and the score at the end of the third quarter stood, East Detroit, 13, Baldwin, 6.

The Maroons failed to lose their power plays to usher in the final period and with Capt. Bob Harrington driving hard, carried the oval to East Detroit's six yard stripe. A line back failed to gain but Harrington slipped through tackle behind good blocking to tally the locals' second touchdown and bring his team within one point of a tie score. However, the attempt for point after touchdown failed and the Maroons were left to fend for themselves.

With only two minutes to play, the Maroon gridders hammered at their opponents' tackles for consistent gains. The East Detroit secondary, straining out, anticipating a passing attack, Baldwin chances brightened when two consecutive cut-back plays carried the pigskin to the opponents' 12 yard stripe. Andrews, who had been edged to the game, took a pass from center and raced around his own right end for the remaining 10 yards and chucked up the third and winning touchdown for Birmingham. Last year in the first game between the two teams, Michigan won by a 13 to 0 margin. The Quaker team is expected to be a strong contender for the national championship.

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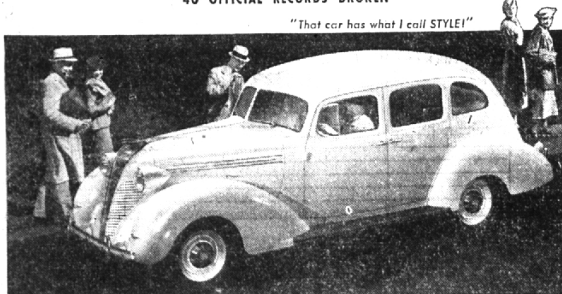
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
