Floyd Gibbons Is Detroit Town Hall Speaker On Nov. 11

Floyd Gibbons, world-famous war correspondent, will be the Town Hall speaker in the Fisher Theatre, Wednesday morning, Nov. 11 (Armistice Day), at 11 o'clock. The sensational American "headline hunter" will tell his thrilling eye-witness story of the Spanish revolution.

Gibbons has been at the front line of every major war in recent years. He was the first American newspaper correspondent to be sent to the Italian front during the Italo-Ethiopian war. He was able to beat all other correspondents to the scene by obtaining special permission from Mussolini, himself, to make the trip.

He began his thrilling newspaper life as a war correspondent with Villa in Mexico, and later with Pershing on the latter's expedition in search of Villa. Then he jumped across the Atlantic to a real war, taking passage on the S. S. Lacomia on what proved to be her fatal trip through the submarine zone. The Lacomia was torpedoed off the coast of Ireland.
