## Garden Unit Will Open Season With Novel Program on Birds

An illustrated lecture on birds accompanied by bird calls and imitations will be given by Walter P. Nickell of the Cranbrook Institute of Science before members of the Birmingham unit of the Women's National Farm and Garden Association, at the initial meeting this year at the Community House, Monday, Oct. 12, at 2 p. m.

Mr. Nickell will also exhibit various types of nests and nesting materials. The subject of his address will be "Birds in Relation to Our Gardens." An informal tea will follow the meeting.

Mrs. Ralph I. Coryell, chairman of the Before and After contest has announced Oct. 1 as the date when the second photograph must be submitted to the committee. The photograph should be accompanied by an explanation, telling briefly what was attempted, and how it was carried out. The second photograph should be taken from the same angle as the first submitted in the spring.

The size recommended is 3 1/2 by 4 1/2 inches, and the print must be made in black and white with a glossy finish. Entries in the contest will be judged by Charles J. Shain, Mrs. W. D. Thompson and Mrs. E. H. McKinney.

In making their decisions, the judges will give 30 percent for the explanation with the second photograph, and 70 percent for the photographic evidence. In this will be considered clearness, the degree of permanence in the mode of improvement and good taste exhibited.
