## Make Your Own Puffs And Eclairs

Cream puffs and eclairs are not hard to make, in fact they are most simple if the right proportion and right directions are followed. The only difference in the cream puffs and the eclairs is the shape in which they are baked and in the filling and frosting that are used. Cream puffs are round, filled with whipped cream or a custard and then dusted with confectioners sugar. Eclairs are oblong, they may be filled with chocolate cream, custard or whipped cream. The tops are covered with a frosting, usually chocolate.

**Recipe for Cream Puffs and Eclairs**  
 1/2 cup butter  
 1 cup boiling water  
 1/8 teaspoon salt  
 1 cup flour  
 4 eggs

Melt butter in boiling water. When again boiling, add flour and salt. Stir rapidly until mixture cleaves from the side of the pan. Remove from fire, cook one of the eggs and beat until smooth. Beat vigorously for a few moments longer. In a similar manner add the remaining eggs one at a time, beating well after each egg is added. After all the eggs have been added beat the mixture well for three minutes. Longer beating will improve the mixture. Shape on greased baking sheet. Bake in oven 450 degrees for twenty minutes, decrease heat to 350 degrees and bake for 30 minutes.

**Custard Filling**  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 1-1/2 teaspoons flour  
 1 1/2 tablespoons cornstarch  
 2 eggs slightly beaten  
 1/4 teaspoon salt  
 1 1/4 teaspoon salt  
 2 cups milk

Mix sugar with flour, cornstarch, salt and enough milk to make a smooth batter. Add to the remaining milk which has been scalded. Cook until mixture thickens, stirring constantly. Place over hot water and continue cooking longer. In a similar manner, stirring occasionally. Add eggs and beat until they thicken slightly. Remove from the fire and add flavoring.

The tops of well risen puffs are always uneven and seamed. A cut may be made along one of the cracks and a small portion of the top removed. The custard or cream may then be put in the puffs and the tops replaced. Dust with confectioners sugar.

**Eclairs**  
 The dough for an éclair is shaped into a long strip and then baked as a cream puff. Fill the center with custard given above or whipped cream. Cover with chocolate frosting.

**Chocolate Frosting**  
 Two squares of chocolate  
 One tablespoon hot water  
 One egg well beaten  
 1/2 cup confectioners sugar  
 1/4 cup butter  
 Melt the chocolate over hot water in a double boiler. Add water, sugar and egg, beat well. Let it stand over hot water several minutes. Cool to luke warm. Add butter a tablespoon at a time stirring until smooth, spread on eclairs.

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
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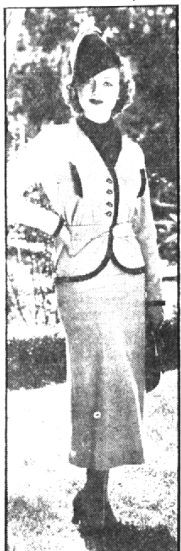
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
