**THE MARCH OF POLITICS**

The greatest missionary work of the Republican Party in Michigan must be done among industrial workers of the state whose lot has improved since 1929. These workers use a simple and forefallow logic. It goes something like this: three years ago I was working four days a week and earning \$17; this year I am working six days a week and earning \$37. Sometimes they add personal details, they have accumulated saving accounts, or paid off their mortgage, or bought a new car. They attribute their comparative prosperity to Roosevelt.

There are many of these people because the majority of them are employed in automobile or automobile accessory plants and the motor car industry started an in-mill finding the recovery parade. Areas in which they live are depended upon by the Democrats to elect the remainder of the state. They assume that the plant employees of Detroit, Flint, Pontiac and a few other industrial centers will be sufficient to offset the vote of merchants, farmers, business men and the residue of rural or small town areas.

The flaw in the workers' logic is that they give no credit to the automobile manufacturers and business in general for recovery. They forget that the industry of the nation was reeled by Roosevelt brought recovery and that the manufacturers merely reap the benefits of it.

Businessmen are united in the belief that complete recovery will come under a Republican administration that tells them definitely where it stands. Therefore, they are Republican. They live in an illogical situation in which the men upon whose recovery depend for their prosperity are for one party and the majority of the workers are for the opponent of business.
