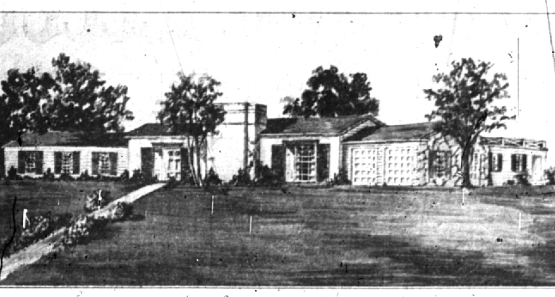
day, Oct. 17. Neither car was badly damaged.
