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**BITS ON BRIDGE**

Lecture Points

The initial meeting of the "contract bridge" held in the Community House Tuesday afternoon, took up the frequently holding problem. House took the combined honor trick holding opening suit bids of one and partner's response. A review of the points is given below.

**Honor Tricks**

Honor tricks are high cards that alone or in combination with other high cards will win tricks both on defense or offense. There are only eight and one-half honor tricks in any one deal of four honors in the average. The valuation of honors is as follows: AK 2 Honor Trick, A, K, Q, J, 10, 9, 8, 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2, 1. Honor Trick, K, Q, J, 10, 9, 8, 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2, 1.

**Opening Suit Bids of One**

If the 5-2 honors in any one deal are distributed evenly, a hand will hold only 2½ honor tricks. Therefore, to open the bidding in this hand, one must hold more than average hands. Requirements for initiating the bidding, any two-trick, valuable or not, considerable, are as follows: At least three honor tricks in the hand, a suitable suit, and four probable tricks.

Referring to the requirements, a holdable suit is any four-card holding headed by the king and higher honor (QJ10x); any five-card suit headed by jack or better (AJKxx); any six-card suit headed by ace or better (AKJxx); and a suit headed by king, queen, and jack (KQJxx). Possible tricks are 1-4 honor tricks on that the 4-5 suit is expected to be won only on the offense. Almost every hand that has 5-2 honors to open the bidding also has four probable tricks. Opening bids depend on last factor for the one-trick opening necessary for his contract.

**Responding to Suit Bids of One**

Partner of the one-trick bidder has four alternative responses to his bid. One only part of his hand is worth less than partner's bid suit, take suit, or another suit of equal trump. His response should be given by the 4-5 suit opening up of 4-5 hand and 2-2 combined honor trick bids. The latter is important and should be memorized along with the honor table as it serves as a guide for punishing opponents as well as locating your partnership holding at the trump level.

The combined honor trick table is as follows: If your hand and that of partner's combined hold 14-12 honor trick. Then only one of a suit or one-trump should be bid, if both the 4-5 suit and 2-2 honor trick, two of three of a suit or two trumps may be bid, if it is a 4 honor trick, one hold in the combined hands then game should be reached either at some suit or on no-trump. When the combined hands hold over 12½ honors you may also in the same suit.

Now, if partner opens the bidding with one of a suit, you, a partner, should think about your own strength. If your hand contains one and one-half honor trick, there must be some bid available. If your holding includes no bid-dable suit, to support for partner's suit but does have over one honor trick, then respond with no-trumps which, next to a pass, is the weakest response in bridge. If your hand has no support for partner's suit but contains a bid-dable suit, name that suit in preference to no-trump.

If partner opens with a major suit one-bid and you hold support for his suit in addition to a bid-dable suit of your own, the rule is to name your suit unless you can give partner a double trick or other point worth remembering. This if your hand has over 12½ honors over no bid-dable suit, respond with two no-trumps over partner's one bid.

Under the Culbertson System, the method of raising partner's bid suit often confuses many

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
