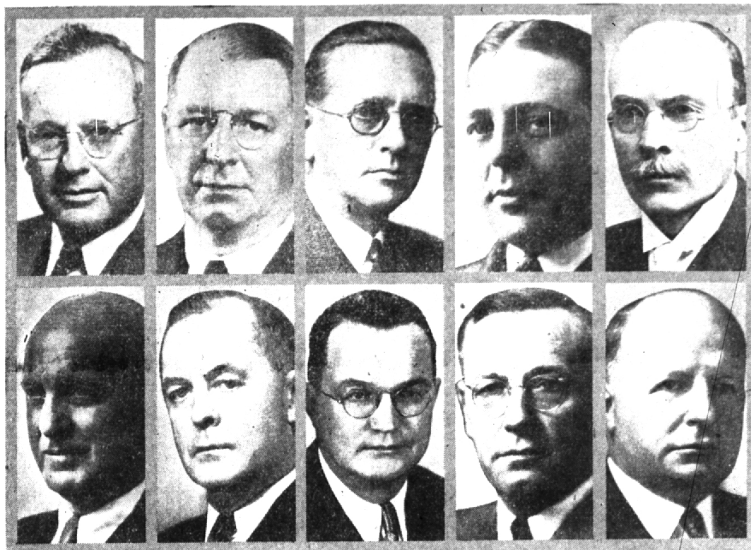

David Irwin, the only man to travel alone across Arctic North America, will speak on "Aone Across the Top of the World," with motion pictures, at the Detroit Institute of Arts at 7:30 on Sunday afternoon, November 1.

The 24-year-old explorer was set ashore on the coast north shore of Alaska. With his dog team he made 2,500 miles over swamps and tundra, mountain passes, bright barriers, frozen water courses. Among his motion picture highlights, the blue-eyed Eskimos, the Andromeda Bay region, a expedition hunting polar bear, walrus, caribou and whales.

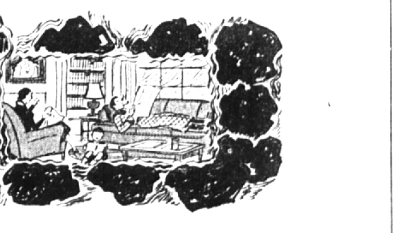
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
