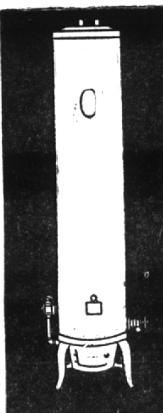
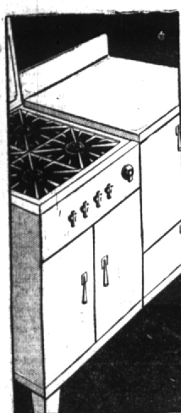
### NEW WWJ STUDIOS TO BE DEDICATED

#### A REMINDER LIST OF WORTHWHILE BOOKS

"Life with Father" by Clarence Day was written in the last year of this clever writer's life. It is a delightful collection of essays written from real life and will afford no end of pleasure.

"Scherz to the Orient" by Anne Morrow Lindbergh is a modest and simple account of what it is like to travel by plane over arid, hazy lands and seas.

"The Exile" by Pearl Buck is a beautiful tribute to her mother who spent the greater part of her life in China as the wife of a missionary.

"The Stars Look Down" by A. J. Cronin is a story of a young doctor who is forced to read it.

"Old Fables" by Mark Sandvo is a true story of the experiences of a young man named "Old Fables" of Nebraska. The fact that it was awarded the 1935 Atlantic Monthly nonfiction prize of \$10,000 should recommend it still further.

"Man the Unknown" by Alek's Carril has been a best seller for months and is the best of new non-fiction in the field of the most distinguished book dealers in medical circles.

"Wake Up and Live" by Dorothy Brande is a valuable formula for successful living designed to fit the average practical minded individual.

"Vein of Iron" by Ellen Glasgow is the story of the fortunes of a middle class family living in the great valley of Virginia.

"Life on the Hill" by H. L. Day is a book worth the price of thirty years ago. This book is one of the "Harper and Pulitzer prizes."

### The MARCH OF POLITICS

In the Senate Committee investigation of Michigan campaign expenditures is an average sample of the political maneuvering that the tactics of that party have been vast overrated.

After all these months that have been made of administration interference in the state campaign in Michigan, the worst thing to be said is to see that no more attention of this sort should be given to the Democratic leaders, especially did not make a change, with the motto about and proceeded to set on foot another example of state government with Washington as the state capital.

Not really nothing, except that Brackett made it plain that the investigation was a plan that was more or less than an old-fashioned "case of election" piece of politics. What the Democrats expected to gain by the investigation is obvious, but they expected to gain in a mystery. A few more moves like this and Michigan would be in any doubt at all.

In this column two weeks ago, the party division of the Democratic National Committee to claim credit for the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation for the Roosevelt Administration was discussed. Since that time Frank Murphy, the former United High Commissioner, has taken to decrying the work of Senator Vandenberg on the insurance guaranty amendment. According to Murphy, Vandenberg deserves no credit for the amendment that bears Vandenberg's name.

Vandenberg replies that the first time deposit insurance was mentioned in Congress was in 1913 when he introduced a specific and definite bill.

Murphy says Congressman Stewart, a Democrat, supported the bill in the House and Senator Glass, a Democrat, in the Senate. Vandenberg admits Staggal helped greatly in the House, but that Glass certainly did not in the Senate.

Much to Murphy's embarrassment, Welsh then challenged him to a debate and set up a point-by-point schedule of debatable questions. Welsh gave Murphy 24 hours in which to reply. Three days later Murphy declined the challenge on the grounds that a debate between two Democrats would not make for a satisfactory situation. The box vote tested three candidates, two challenges, no debate.

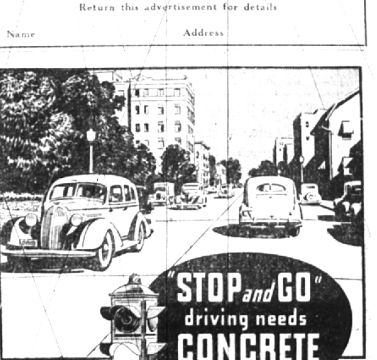
