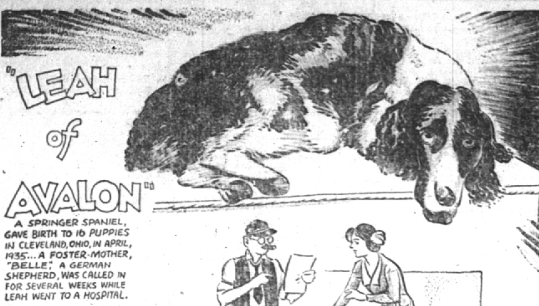
Track, Baseball and Tennis Squads Win Initial Tests of Year

BALDWIN LOSES TO FERDALE AS HURLERS ASCEND

Pitchers Issue 12 Passes As Winners Score 8 Unearned Runs

Pitching can make or break a ball team, and pitching lost an otherwise well-played game for Baldwin High School to Ferdale, Friday, April 28, by a score of 9-6. Despite the loss, local fans found much to rejoice in as the Maroon batsmen slammed out 13 hits in the seven innings played, two of them going for extra bases. Every one of the Maroons' runs were earned, while the Ferdals' runs earned only one of their nine tallies, that coming on the lone hit they got off of the pitching of Jones and Collins. In contrast to this, the two Birmingham hurlers yielded 12 bases on balls to their opponents, and Snyder and Forester, who divided the catching duties in the game, allowed five passed balls.

Had Jones been able to locate the plate in the first, the outcome would have undoubtedly been a different story. After the Maroons had been held scoreless in their half of the first, Olson, leading off for Ferdale, fanned, Kitti and McRipley walked. Both men advanced on a passed ball by Snyder. Pasco popped to Jones. Higgins walked. Higgins went to second, McRipley to third, and Kitti struck out. In the second, the Birmingham clubbers got two of those runs back. Jones now playing center field, opened with a single. Adams fanned. Collins, batting in seventh position in place of Good, doubled to deep center, scoring Jones. Forester singled, scoring Collins. Kirby flew to Kolos in right and Wallace fanned.
