HILLS DIRECTOR STRESSES TRIPS

Student Excursions Form Part Of Bloomfield School Program

Trips and excursions play an important part in the program of elementary education at the Bloomfield Hills School, according to Mr. W. A. Shumck, Director of the school. Carefully planned and thoroughly supervised trips for pupils in grades one to six are a definite part of the school program. In some cases trips are taken in connection with the introduction of a new unit or phase of work, while at other times they act as a climax to an activity that has been in progress for a number of days.

Last week the Hills School pupils went on two trips which illustrate two uses made of excursions. Wednesday, members of the Elementary Student Council, under the supervision of Mrs. Kathleen Wright, visited the Cranbrook Institute of Science. Dr. Hatt, Director of the Science department, took the group through the Institute and pointed out those things which might create an interest in starting a museum in the elementary grades of the Hills School. Pupils making the trip were: Alfred AHS, Richard Shiley, Mary Jean Tyson, Barbara Moore, Arthur Winfield, Arthur Slade, and James Howell. This is a splendid example of the type of trip used in introducing a new activity.

An excursion of another type was also an event of last week. Since the study of land transportation is one phase of the Social Studies program in grade two, naturally railway trains and buses are studied in this connection. For several days the second grade group at the Hills School has been studying the train and bus as means of transportation. As a climax to this activity six members of the second grade: Betty Davison, Betty Tjarda, Jimmy Howell, Jimmy Morrox, Robert Bradley, and Barbara Zeder went on an interesting excursion last Friday afternoon. They went from school directly to the Birmingham Grand Trunk Railway station where each child purchased his ticket for a trip to Pontiac. They then boarded the 2:10 train for the nearby city. The conductor showed the children through the train and explained its different parts. Even the locomotive came in for its share of interested attention. Upon arrival in Pontiac the group went directly to the bus station where they purchased their own tickets for Bloomfield Hills. Their arrival in Bloomfield Hills marked the close of a very interesting and worth while excursion.
