In a program ranging from German lieder through modern French and English songs, Hildegarde Lasell, New York soprano, carried her audience to artistic heights in a song recital Monday evening at the Community House, for the benefit of the West Bloomfield Unit of the League of Catholic Women. Miss Lasell brought to her performance, a warm, rich voice—always unerringly controlled, but nevertheless, one of wide range, and abundant in tone coloring. In her first group of five songs, Schubert's "Der Doppelgänger," "The Shadow" was the best. "Who! Who!" by Schubert, second of the lieder, was somewhat weak, in comparison with her first performance. Conquillan provided adequate support to the artist in his work as accompanist. Notwithstanding the inclement weather of Monday evening, the concert was well attended, and the audience particularly appreciative.

Others in this group included "None but the Lonely Heart" by Lehar, "Mein Lieber, Mein Lieber" by Brahms, and two songs by Richard Strauss, "Zueignung" (Devotion) and "Ceely," the latter by Schubert.

After several colorful songs in English, the program closed with "The Messenger" by La Forge, in which Miss Lasell reached high D with amazing skill and brilliance. 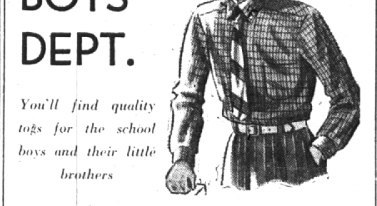

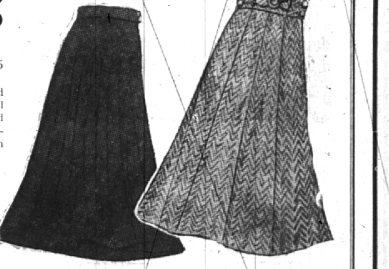
