Smith's Beget of Torrey A., Hood's and Smith Addition, lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13 of Clark and Cobb Subd., shown on the Zoning Map as Single-Family Residence District, shall be changed to be Single-Family District.

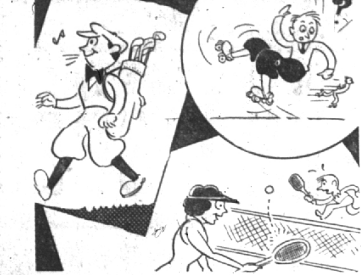
