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Recipes For Refreshing Drinks For A Warm August Afternoon

One terribly hot afternoon last week a friend called me to tea. "Only," she said, "it won't be tea, it will be a fruit drink." It was a most impressive and cooling drink, while frost covered the inside of the glass and you could hear the tinkling of ice from the inside; it was decorated with a sprig of mint. Try some refreshing drinks on your friends and you'll be well repaid for the trouble.

Grape Fix
4 cups gingerale.
1 1/2 cups grapejuice.
1/2 cup cold water.
Combine ingredients and serve in tall glasses with cracked ice.

Watermelon Ice
5 cups crushed watermelon.
4 tablespoons lemon juice.
1/2 cup sugar.
To prepare the watermelon, cut out center and remove seeds. Put watermelon through food chopper, using a very fine blade. Drain off 1-2 cups juice. Add the sugar to the juice and cook until it forms a syrup. Pour syrup over the watermelon, add lemon juice and let stand about 1 hour. Pour into a freezing tray and freeze. Break vigorously with a spoon every 15 minutes until mixture is frozen.

Frosted Coffee
Make coffee according to your method, allowing 2 level tablespoons to cup water. Chill. Put a small scoop of chocolate ice cream in a tall glass and pour on the coffee. Add 1-3 to 1-2 teaspoon sugar and stir until the ice cream is melted. Serve at once.

Golden Frost
In each glass place a few thin slices of banana and a small scoop of orange sherbet. Fill up glass with gingerale.

Fruit Fix
2 cups unsweetened pineapple juice.
3 tablespoons lemon juice.
3/4 cup of orange juice.
1 cup gingerale.
1/2 cup powdered sugar.
Mix all ingredients together and pour over cracked ice. Serve with sliced apricots in water, and Marshmallowy in glass.

Tomato Juice Shake
Shake lightly 1 can of chilled tomato juice and half as much fresh milk. Pour into glasses and add a dash of ground cloves to each serving.

Minted Chocolate
To 1 cup of milk add 2 tablespoons of chocolate syrup. Add a little cold milk to the chocolate syrup, stirring until well blended, then add remaining milk and a few drops of peppermint flavoring. Top with whipped cream or a spoonful of ice cream and a sprig of mint.

Spiced Tea Frost
2-3 cup granulated sugar.
2 cups cold water.
1 cup orange and 1 lemon.
Lemon sections.
3 one-inch pieces stick cinnamon.
5 cups freshly made hot tea.
Combine all the ingredients but the tea, boil 15 minutes and then strain. Cool, add the tea, mix well and pour over ice in tall glasses. Serve with lemon sections.

Frozen Lemonade, Syrup
1 1/2 cups lemon juice.
1 cup granulated sugar.
1-2 cups cold water.
4-5 cups ice water.
Combine the lemon juice, sugar, and cold water and stir until the sugar is dissolved. Turn into a tray of an automatic refrigerator and stir every 15 minutes until consistency. Then remove from tray, add the ice water and stir well. The lemonade is then ready to serve with the addition of ice and any garnish desired.

Terrace Cooler
For 2 tall glasses blend the juice of 1 large lemon or 2 limes, 1 cup unsweetened pineapple juice and 2 teaspoons sugar. Pour over crushed ice and fill glasses with gingerale.

Fruitade
1 cup apricot puree.
1 cup water.
2 cups pineapple juice.
3 cups cold green tea.
1/2 cup lemon juice.
1/2 cup grape juice.
2 cups gingerale.
Prepare apricot puree by cooking dried apricots in water, cover until they are soft. Rub through a sieve. Combine puree with the water and sugar. Boil until sugar is dissolved. Strain and chill. Add fruit juices, gingerale and a few grains of salt. Mix thoroughly. Chill. Serve in tall glasses.

Blended Punch
Blend 1/2 cup lemon juice, 1 cup orange juice and 1 cup of grenadine or raspberry syrup. Let ripen for an hour or more in a closed jar in the refrigerator. Then add 4 cups water and 1 small bottle dry gingerale. Add ice cubes and garnish with a sprig of mint.
