To Speak On Russia

Is the Soviet breaking down? Is it moving toward the conventional type of dictatorship? Or is the Soviet Russia that ever before?

Will it conquer Japan and if so will Russia fight back and if so will Russia win? What about the political exigencies in Russia?

These questions and a number of others regarding 1937 conditions in Russia will be answered by Julien Bryan, world famous authority on Russia, when he speaks and shows his motion pictures, on "Soviet Russia in 1937" at the Cass Tech high school, next Friday evening, Dec. 17, at 8:30.

Mr. Bryan has toured Russia every year for the past eight years. He has talked to Soviet officials, to Soviet business men and laborers, to Soviet peasants. His motion pictures reveal vividly conditions in Russia. His motion pictures and material for this lecture are new and timely, having been prepared during Mr. Bryan's 1937 tour of Russia, from which he recently returned.

The World Adventure Series will close its fall lecture course next Sunday afternoon, December 19, with a lecture on "My Expedition into the Wilds of New Guinea" by Lee S. Crandall, explorer and curator of the New York Zoo. The lecture will be illustrated with motion pictures and is scheduled for 3:30 p. m.

HEIFETZ WILL BE HEARD AS SOLOIST WITH ORCHESTRA

Jascha Heifetz, world-famed and popular violin virtuoso, will appear as guest artist at the sixth subscription concert of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra in Orchestra Hall Thursday night, Dec. 22. Heifetz has chosen for his solo the Tchaikovsky D Major Concerto for violin and orchestra.

A work of striking difficulty and brilliance, Victor Kolar will conduct the concert.

Definitely established as one of the greatest violinists of the generation, Heifetz frequently has been called the successor to Paganini. His appearance with the symphony will be Heifetz's only formal concert performance this season in Detroit.

Kolar has built a well-balanced program that will include an important novelty, to be offered for the first time here. Still another first performance in Detroit will be the transcription of Handel's Overture in D Minor by Sir Edward Elgar, the great English composer, who died three years ago.

The novelty, a work titled "A Suite of Music by Royalty," is by the young American composer Quinto Maganini. Freely transcribed for orchestra, "A Suite of Music by Royalty" is made up of four contrasting sections, each an appealing piece of music.

The four parts bear the titles "Passeyte with Goode Company" (The Kyng's Ballade), "Amaryllic" (Madrigal) (Languish and Die), and "Military March." They are credited, respectively, to Henry VIII, King of England (1491-1547), King of France (1501-1543), Gesualdo, Prince of Venosa (Italy), (1560-1611), and Frederick the Great, King of Prussia, (1712-1786).

In honor of the seventy-second anniversary of the birth of the Finnish contemporary, which occurred Dec. 8, the orchestra will play a work typical of that composer, the Tone Poem, "En Sagen." Op. 5. At each of its previous performances this composition met with enthusiastic approval.

Elgar's arrangement of Handel's Overture will be used to open the program. The concluding number will be Brunnhilde's Immolation from Act III of Wagner's "Die Walkure" (Götterdämmerung). The violin concerto will be heard just before the intermission.
