The immortal melodies of ancient French and English carols, still fresh and beautiful, will usher in the Yuletide spirit in Birmingham when the Ypsilanti Normal Choir appears at the Baptist church on Friday, Dec. 10. The concert will be given under auspices of the Birmingham Musicals.

This year's program will consist of melodies already familiar to local audiences, telling the joy and beauty of the Christmas season in the traditional tunes of many ages. In contrast with the solemn beauty of the Russian liturgical music which will lend a rich dignity to the singing.

This season will mark Dr. Frederick Alexander's 20th year as conductor of the Ypsilanti Normal Choir, which, in some measure, explains why the name has achieved national recognition.
