### Delicious Holiday Foods Are Planned So Hostesses May Enjoy More Leisure

This is the busiest, most exciting time of the whole year. Plan the festivities that are to make the holiday season really enjoy them when the time arrives. The star of the month is the turkey, but there are many honors with a lot of other attractions. Here are a few recipes which will please the most fastidious guest.

**Delicious Canape**  
Pimientos  
Cream cheese  
Tomato catsup  
Slice the bread very thin, cut bell shape and then toast a delicate brown. Butter the bread and cover with a mixture of cream cheese and catsup, season with salt and paprika. Place on top of this bell cut out of pimiento just to fill the toasted bell.

**Baked Oysters**  
32 cups oysters.  
2 cups grated cheese.  
1 1/2 cups canned tomatoes.  
Salt, pepper, paprika.  
Wash, drain and pat oysters dry. Arrange in a large casserole dish. Dust with salt, pepper and cheese over the oysters. Drain liquid from a can of solid pack tomatoes and spread the thick pulp over the oysters. Bake 20 minutes in an oven 400 degrees and serve immediately.

**Asparagus Custard**  
3 eggs.  
2 cups milk.  
1 1/2 cups canned asparagus cut in 1/2 inch pieces.  
2 tablespoons melted butter.  
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind.  
Dash of nutmeg.  
Salt and pepper.  
Beat eggs until light. Add milk, asparagus, butter, lemon rind and nutmeg. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Pour into a greased baking dish. Set in a pan of hot water and bake in an oven 350 degrees until the custard is set.

**Squash Croquettes**  
4 tablespoons fat.  
4 tablespoons flour.  
1 teaspoon salt—pepper.  
Dash of nutmeg.  
2 cups mashed squash.  
1 tablespoon parsley, chopped.  
4 cup peanuts.  
Heat fat, add flour, salt and pepper and mix until smooth. Add milk gradually, stirring constantly. Cook over hot water until very thick. Add squash, parsley and peanuts. Turn into a shallow dish and chill. Shape as desired. Dip in beaten egg (add 1 tablespoon water to each egg) and roll in fine bread crumbs. Place in a fryer basket, lower into deep fat and fry until golden brown.

**Chicken Salad with Egg Border**  
3/4 cups cold cooked chicken cut in pieces.  
1 1/2 cups chopped celery.  
Salt and pepper.  
5 hard boiled eggs.  
1/2 cup chopped olives.  
Mix chicken and celery, add salt and pepper to taste. Marinate in French dressing. Chill. Add olives and mix with a little mayonnaise. Mound on crisp lettuce on a platter, spread lightly with mayonnaise and decorate with slices of stuffed olives. Cut eggs in halves lengthwise, remove the yolks and mash, add a little cream or mayonnaise. Season well with salt, pepper and paprika. Divide the yolks over the chicken.

### Record Time

"It's Wonderful," warbles Benny Goodman's band. And so is their version of it. Stacy's piano plays all calculations by being just as good as that of Wilson: in fact, everybody turns in a nice, mellow job on this polished production. To confuse our perception, on-the-beat, we'll freely admit that Martha Tilton manages the vocal very adequately.

"Thanks for the Memory," on 'other side, is even more fun. All hail to the gorgeous clarinet ride which opens it, as smooth and sweet as you'll find in a month of listening. And Martha, aided by some very swell vocals, surpasses her other performance.

"If Dreams Come True" is more Goodman. 'Tis so much like Savoy that it's as mellow as his original version of that lovely. And Krupa's licks are the hottest thing in town. "Life Goes to a Party" merits its popularity, with special orchids to the brasses. We especially recommend the jam clarinet riffs along about the middle, assisted by Krupa and his stuff; and the wacky finale, which will make you think the record is cracked or that you are.

"Where or When" is played by guests whose Trio? It's mostly piano, and very good piano it is, too. But might we breathe a timid wish that he hadn't jammed quite so much? Now Critics, don't get sore and advise us to take piano lessons. We think it's their best since "The Man I Love," but we like to be able to recognize the song, either through melody or timing.

"I'm a Ding-Dong Daddy" is the Quartette, featuring some especially swell chases by piano and vibraphone. There's a lot of indecently fast work by all of 'em.

and that ending is sheer genius, say what you will. On mature consideration, we like four of 'em better than three of 'em. And they can always play bridge in their spare time, too.

"Just for a change, we now consider the case of Lionel Hampton versus "Everybody Loves My Baby." It's straight of the cob, men, and ole King Cole certainly beats the tar outta them drums, first with trumpet and then with vibraphone.

"I Just Couldn't Take It, Baby" other-sides the disc. Now here is a revival of a marvelous number, so skillful that it's as good or better than it was when a current favorite. You'll hand it to 'em when you hear it.

Almost lost in the shuffle is Hal Kemp, playing "Good Night, Angel." It's the sort of sweet

m'elancholy piece he loves and renders so patly. Bob Allan emulates Miss Tilton, by improving on it. "Swingin' in the Corn" is a perfect ending. This cute ditty gets all started up with "Arkansas Traveler" and "Turkey in the Straw," to the advantage of all three. And ye words are cub-ruby.

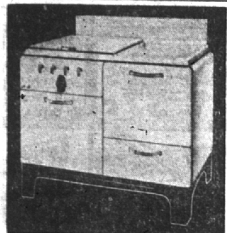
