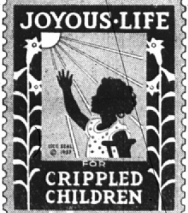

"Mother, I don't want cocoa after the hobnob party. That's what you make me have at the time of my parties, and I'm getting sick of it."

"What do you want, Patricia?" "Coffee!"

"For the last time I tell you I will not serve coffee to 12 and 13 year old children. Now that's final. I'm going to give you a hard drink, made out of grape juice."

"At the party you said and went to last evening, there wasn't a koby under 100 and we had the same thing. It's quite new, as you'll be doing something really different in serving it."

Patricia began to show interest. "Is it just plain grape juice?" "No, it's called mulled grape juice, and it's simply delicious. We'll serve with it sandwiches made of dandelion which bread with a filling of cottage cheese and chopped olives. Then we'll have stuffed grapes, and some of my home-made cake."

"But what do you mean by mulled grape juice?" "I don't think that sounds so bad."

"Well, hot is the word, because mulled grape juice is heated in a double boiler with stick cinnamon and a little sugar for about 20 minutes. Before pouring it into glasses, you strain it.
