Laddis' team, on the floor with a full line-up for the first time in several weeks, made McBrides' hustle to win, 32 to 21. The score at the half was tied at 14 apiece. Ken McBride led his team in scoring with eight field goals and two free throws for 18 points, a season's record.
Tonight's schedule will see McBrides pitted against the second-place Peck's squad in what promises to be their toughest struggle of the season. These teams have not met since the opening night in December when McBrides won 30 to 21. Peck's have gained much strength since then and will prove a real test to the undefeated league leaders. In the second contest DeMolay will face Laddis. These teams are trailing in the league but are evenly matched and should provide an interesting contest. The feature game on the night's card will be a contest between the Eccentric and Rochester. This is the wind-up of a three-game series between these teams and both squads should be keyed up to a fighting pitch. This game will start at 8 o'clock with the first game starting at 7 o'clock. FORM, WIN 36-18Defeat Rochester Falcons
On Latter's Court Fast
Tuesday Eve

The Birmingham basketball team defeated the Rochester court squad by a score of 36 to 18 Tuesday night playing on the latter's court. The local boys, although not playing top-notch ball were far superior to their opponents. The Maroons snatched the lead in the early part of the game and kept it, unchallenged through-out. Lawler started the ball rolling for Birmingham when he dribbled the length of the floor to capture the first scoring honors. Archie Clark, Lawler and Langerman dropped the ball through the hoop to the tune of 13 points in the first quarter, while the Falcons failed to dent the bet. The Rochester boys managed to slip the basket in the second quarter and left for the locker room at the half with the score against them 19-6. Langerman snatched two points on charity shots and Clark placed in a couple under the basket.

The second half brought a change in style in the game as both teams were playing a variation of the zone defense instead of the man-to-man plan that was started with Birmingham soon switched back to their former mode of defense when Rochester walked off with six points at the beginning of the second half. The Falcons staged a little rally in this period and added ten points to their score, but failed to score again until the last two minutes of the game when Hoppe ran in from the corner to flip one into the hoop.

Langerman and Lawler were the scoring stars of the last half making 12 points between them. Birmingham was doing nicely paying and seemed to be feeding the ball to the forwards better in the final period of the game. The Maroons should be entitled to the high point honors; Langerman with 13, Clark with 11, and Lawler with 10. Hoppe received honors for Rochester with 8 points.

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
