Slides Will Show Steps In Making Of World Famous Patterns

When one thinks of Brussels, Belgium, one recalls all the lovely old lace for which the city is famous. Mrs. Henry Patten of Brussels, will bring the romance of old lace to Birmingham in an address Monday afternoon before members of the Birmingham unit of the Women's National Farm and Garden Association at the Community House at 2 o'clock.

Mrs. Patten will illustrate her talk with slides showing various kinds of laces and steps in the minute processes of lace-making. These slides have an interesting history. The property of the Museum at Brussels, they were used to a women's organization known as Les Amis de la Dentelle, and through this group they were again loaned to Mrs. Patten.

The purpose of the organization is to perpetuate the knowledge of old lace, and to improve living conditions among lace-makers. Mrs. Patten will not limit herself to a discussion of Belgium lace only, but will also include other famous patterns. Mrs. Patten is here to make an extended visit with her son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Mary F. Patten of Bloomfield Hills. Mrs. Bruce R.
