

# GMT QUINTET WINNER, 20-16

Visitors Down Eccentric  
Squad In 'Y' Feature  
Match Thursday

The hardest fought exhibition basketball game of the year was staged at Barnum School gym last Thursday night when Body Supplies, General Motors Truck team, of Pontiac, defeated The Eccentric quintet, 20 to 16. The opening game of the evening's Y. M. C. A. schedule was the Peck-Ladd contest, won by the former, 20 to 18, and the second game brought together McBrides and DeMolay with McBrides winning 23 to 21.

In the Eccentric-General Motors game, both teams started cautiously but before the half ended, it was a fast, fierce struggle for supremacy with neither side getting the edge, the score at the half being 11 to 11. In the closing minutes of the contest, with the score 16-16, General Motors sunk two baskets to put them in the lead 20-16 and ending the scoring.

Eccentric players were absent due to graduation exercises and it was only with the help of Ken McBride, borrowed for the game, that they were able to put up such a good contest.

In the Peck-Ladd contest, the absence of Engel, Whitney and Robinson who were attending graduation exercises, forced the team to make substitutions. Jimmy Drumh, always a favorite in local sports, and who was expected to through his scoring was nil he provided plenty of fun for the fans, Peck leading 18-18, the score at the half being 11-11.

McBride again led his team in scoring to win over DeMolay 33-21 in the second game. He sunk five field goals and four free throws, the score at the half was 12-9, McBrides leading.

Tonight's games at Barnum gym will be Eccentric vs. Peck at 7 o'clock and at 8 McBrides will play Ladd. The exhibition game at 9 o'clock will be between DeMolay and Loyal Dodge's Plant One team from General Motors Truck. Loyal played in the Birmingham Y. M. C. A. league for several seasons some years ago and many of his old friends will appreciate the chance to see him again.

Attendance at the games is increasing each week but it is felt that much more interest should be taken in the league by spectators. These games are open to the public and start at seven o'clock, the admission price being ten cents.
