The BOOK SHELF

Late Book Reviews and Literary Criticism

JANE AUSTEN - 1775-1817
Jane Austen, who died in 1817, the mother of the modern novel, was born at Steventon, in Hampshire in 1775. She was the youngest of seven children and lived during the age of Scott. Her father was an Episcopal Rectory of a small parsonage in the quiet life of a vicar. Without doubt she never got more than fifty miles from home. The only excursions she ever made were little trips to the fashionable resort at Bath. Yet in spite of her very quiet and uneventful life which she lived in other novels has even approached her in her particular domain. It was in her little perplexities that she was at her best. She thoroughly understood the trivial daily comedy in provincial life and with delicate and slightly ironical grace and humor she wrote of the most common-place every day life in a small village. Her novels are a clear flowing style and all her writing as well as her own life were absolutely free from all sensationalism. Her novels depended upon crime, passion or religion to hold the interest of her readers. Such was her power of searching observation and sympathetic imagination that she could make the most ordinary situations seem vitally interesting.

She loved her home and spent a great deal of time in the care of it. It is also said that she was an accomplished seamstress. She wrote many long and interesting letters and spent considerable time writing abroad. In 1801 the family moved to Bath where her father died in 1805. That left the mother, Jane and her sister Cassandra alone since the boys had all left home by that time. The three ladies moved to Southampton in 1805 and later to Chawton in 1809 where Jane remained until her death in 1817.

Her most widely read and perhaps her best work, "Pride and Prejudice" was her first. It was written in 1796 but not published until 1813, two years after "Sense and Sensibility." The slow marketing of her first book evidently discouraged her for nothing was written between the years 1798 and 1809 except a very fragmentary piece of work, "The Watsons." Between 1811 and 1812 she wrote "Mansfield Park," "Emma" and "Persuasion." The last mentioned together with "Northanger Abbey" which was written in 1798 were published posthumously in 1818.

Recognition came slowly to her. In fact it was not until recent years that it was considered essential of read her if one wished to be cultured. She is now established as an English Classic and ranks far above the other women writers of her day. Maria Edgeworth, Fanny Burney and Mrs. Radcliffe. Although it is only lately that Jane Austen has become a household word she has always been admired among the best intellects—Scott was an enthusiastic admirer as were also Coleridge, Macaulay, Tennyson, Disraeli and Archbishop Whately, the last of whom is said to have been her discoverer.

(She wrote six complete novels.)
