Late Book Reviews and Literary Criticism

SELECTED READING FOR BOYS AND GIRLS

With restricted budgets in both the home and the library it is very necessary to use great care in the selection of reading matter for the boys and girls. First of all the books must appeal to the reader otherwise they won't be read. And next in importance they must be clean and wholesome with a definite educational or recreational value. All books mentioned in the following list have at one time or another been included in recommended lists published by the American Library Association.

Every girl loves such books as "Kate Douglas Wiggin's 'Rebecca of Sunnybrook Farm' which is the story of a little girl who goes to live with two maiden aunts. "Mother Carey's Chickens" is the story of a mother's love and faith in bringing up her four children. Jean Webster's "Just Past 'Teady' Laughing" and "The Enemy" are delightful stories full of the joy of living and written about fun-loving girls. In this same group we must not forget Dorothy Canfield's "Understood Betsy" the story of another girl whose lot it was to live with two maiden aunts who did too much for her. In the latter part of the list she went to live with Uncle Henry" on the farm that she learned to be self-reliant and happy. We must never overlook that prime favorite "Little Women" and all the other splendid books written by Louisa Alcott. Gene Stratton Porter's "Girl of the Limberlost" is especially interesting to Michigan girls since it is written by a woman who lived for many years in a little town just south of the Michigan state line in Indiana and the story itself is a story of the Michigan woods. Her "Brookings" and "Ladies" are both interesting reading for both girls and boys. "The Secret Garden" by Frances Hodgson Burnett is a beautiful story equally enjoyed by boys and girls. What boy could resist reading if he were introduced to "Tom Sawyer" and "Huckleberry Finn" or "Tarkington's 'Peterson'." For the lovers of wildlife there are such titles as Curwood's "Karam" and "The Grizzly King," Jack London's "The Call of the Wild" and Zane Grey's "Wildfire" and "The Young Lion Hunter." As a ready reference on animals Ernest Thompson's "Wild Animals I Have Known" is very useful and don't forget those two old favorites "Black Beauty" and "Beautiful Joe."

For the art-minded we would recommend Charles A. Lindbergh's "WE" and Amelia Earhart's "The Fun of It." These books are both stories of the lives and their adventures in making their solo flights.

The boys and girls who enjoy history and travel will like Wallace's "Ben Hur" which is a historical romance of the time of Christ; Reynolds' "Famous American Trains" and Parkman's "The Oregon Trail" and Dana's "Two Years before the Mast."
