Mrs. J. K. Ormond Cites Responsibilities of Michigan Women To The Problem of War

Editors Note: Mrs. John K. Ormond, local resident, who is state chairman of the study group on the cause and cure of war, and a member of the Detroit Women's International League for Peace work in this effort, has written an article which she explains the Michigan women's responsibility to the problem of war. Her interesting account is given below.

By Mrs. John K. Ormond I am tremendously interested in the cause and cure of war. I might almost say it is my prime interest, for certainly all other interests would be crowded out if it was.

Collect Money Only Because many other agencies are working here to aid the relief work, Mrs. Corson asserted that, to avoid conflict, it should be remembered that the Red Cross is the one agency authorized to collect only money. Foods and clothing are being handled by other organizations.

Henderson, of the University of Michigan, spoke on 'Growing Up or Problems of Adolescence' at a meeting of about 200 members of the Barnum Parent Teachers' Association Thursday evening at Barnum School.

Prof. Henderson said, "An education that does not have capacity for learning, curiosity and training. After having acquired knowledge he must learn how to use it. He needs experience in life, vision, sympathetic understanding of his own people, and a sense of responsibility of books and a thinker thereon."
