Judge Makes Plea For Vigilance In Talk To Club On Safety Needs

A plea for "more vigilance on the part of officers, drivers and pedestrian" was voiced by Municipal Judge Forbes S. Hascall, Tuesday in an address before members of the Birmingham Woman's Club meeting at Baldwin Public Library.

Judge Hascall spoke in conjunction with the club project promoting safety education.

"What we need is not more regulations, but better enforcement and more police officers in Birmingham," Judge Hascall declared. "Then we need more vigilance on the part of officers, drivers and pedestrians. The latter, apparently, can not be regulated."

"Courts should be taken out of business, so that the element of influence is removed. Further, we should have judges trained especially for the work. I feel, also, that we need a more strict enforcement of operators' license laws."

At the conclusion of his talk, Judge Hascall invited club members to question him in regard to traffic problems and regulations.

The principal address of the program was given by Ralph L. Lee of the public relations department of the General Motors Corporation, who spoke on "Perfect Selfishness." He was introduced to the club by Miss Adeline Cook, librarian of Baldwin Public Library.
