

# Ices and Sherbets Are Always Welcome as Warm Weather Desserts and Are Easy to Make

## USE FRESH FRUITS FOR THESE DISHES

Keep Ingredients on Hand and Serve Frequently on Summer Menus

Think of the variety of ices and sherbets and if you are as hot as I am this minute, you'll be glad to be reminded of them. Keep on hand the ingredients to make sherbet and serve it often during the summer months.

**Orange Ice.**  
2 cups water  
1 cup sugar  
1 cup orange juice

2 tablespoons lemon juice  
Grated rind of 1 orange.  
Make a syrup by boiling together the sugar and water for 10 minutes. Add fruit juice and grated rind of orange. Cool and freeze.

**Grape Juice Ice.**  
1 pint grape juice  
1 cup sugar  
1-3 cup orange juice  
2 cups boiling water  
4 tablespoons lemon juice  
Make syrup of sugar and boiling water and boil 10 minutes. Cool and add fruit juice. Freeze.

**Lemon Mint Ice.**  
Bruise a good handful of fresh mint leaves—about as much as can be grasped in the hand—place in a bowl and pour over them 1 cup of boiling water. Let them steep while the other ingredients are being prepared. Hydrate 2 teaspoons of gelatin and let dissolve in 1-2 cup of hot water. Add the juice of 1 large orange and three lemons, 1 cup of sugar and the water from the mint leaves as possible. These quantities when frozen will yield about one quart of ice. A very little green coloring will greatly improve the tint.

**Orange Sherbet**  
1-2 cups juice  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
2 egg whites  
1-2 cup water  
Grated rind of 1 orange  
1-2 cup cream, whipped  
Place the sugar and water in a saucepan and cook 10 minutes. Add the grated rind and cook 5 minutes longer. Remove from heat and strain, cool. Add the fruit juices and pour into refrigerator tray and freeze until firm and until light. Add the beaten egg

**Orange Ice Cup.**  
Place a large square of orange ice in the bottom of a tall, slender glass, fill with ginger ale and garnish with fresh mint leaves.

**Grape Marshmallow Sherbet**  
20 marshmallows  
1-4 cup water  
1-4 cups grapejuice  
2 tablespoons lemon juice  
3 tablespoons sugar  
2 egg whites  
Place the marshmallows in the top of a double boiler over boiling water. Add the water and 2 cups of the grape juice. Heat until the marshmallows are melted, stirring frequently. Remove from the fire, add the lemon juice and remaining grape juice, and 2 tablespoons of the sugar. Pour into the refrigerator tray and chill. Add the remaining tablespoon of sugar to the beaten egg whites and combine with the chilled mixture, mixing thoroughly. Freeze.

In the late 60's, all of the land on the west side of Southfield Avenue extending to a line west of the Rouge River and extending from West Maple avenue to Lincoln avenue, was owned by Mr. Trollop, with the exception of 1 1/2 acres near the south boundary line, which belonged to H. Woodin. The Trollop property later became the property of Rev. Robert D. Bird. The farm house still stands a block from the street and south of the former Miller farm. There were two other sons of the James Miller family besides Rev. J. B. Bird. They were Henry and Volney. Henry's first wife was the former Miss Erwin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Erwin. Her mother was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Beardslee, of Southfield, Mich.

There were two sons and six daughters in the George Beardslee family. The sons were Samuel and Ira. The daughters were Mrs. Jack Erwin, Mrs. Ed Erwin, of Wixom, Mich., Mrs. John Gutting, of Detroit, Mrs. James Dewey, also of Detroit, Mrs. A. Lee Williams, of Owasco, Mich., and Mrs. Charlotte Beardslee, of this city. There also was the mother of the late Harry Dewey and grandmother of Richard Dewey and the late H. Beardslee, who was the father of Emmerson Beardslee, who is the husband of the former Mrs. Mabel McKim, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Renwick McKim.

Volney Miller's wife is the former Miss Emma Brooks. It is believed that they now live in Oxford, Mich. In her younger days, Mrs. Miller was a popular singer of Southfield Township. She is an active member of the Oxford Women's club. For a number of years the Bird farm house was occupied by tenant farmers, and the Bird home was on the northeast corner of Brown street and Southfield avenue. Later the farm property was divided into lots and sold by Mr. Bird.

Mr. and Mrs. L. N. Baker bought the farm house and modernized it. This was their home for a number of years. They have both passed on and are survived by a daughter, Jessie, who is the wife of Mr. Harley Shaver, who has been employed in the Pontiac Post Office for a long time. Another daughter, Nellie, is the wife of Mr. Bern Schoonover, of Huntington Woods, California. Mr. Schoonover was formerly a barber in the city and now owns a barber shop and beauty parlor at Huntington Park. The Schoonovers have several children.

Mr. I. N. Baker and Mrs. Ed McKim were sisters. Their father was Mr. Zack Reynolds. The house south of the farm was owned by Mr. and Mrs. John Bell, formerly of Southfield Township. They were the parents of Mrs. Anna McLaughlin, John David, Mrs. Minnie Hayes and

Mrs. Bessie Olsen, wife of Mr. William Olsen. John is the husband of the former Miss Rose Woodard, of Bedford, Mich. He has passed on. His wife was the former Miss Alta Brasley, of Plymouth, Mich. Minnie has passed on. Mrs. John Bell Sr. was the former Miss Adranana Beebe, sister of the late Mrs. Christina Bell, whose husband was the late William Bell, brother of John Sr. The next owners of the Bell home were Mr. and Mrs. James McKimley, formerly of Southfield Road. Their children are Victor, Röll and Marjane.

The Clighe home, which was next to the McKimley home, has already been described. South of the Clighe home was the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Wilkerson, whose plumbing and heating office is in the former Berger home on Pierce street, and of Mrs. Wilmet Wood and Mrs. Louis Krasnow.

South of the Wilkerson home was the home of the late Mr. and Mrs. George Scott. Other families who lived south of the Scott home were the E. J. McCluskey, George W. Wright, Will Woods, Mr. Foote, Mr. Sullivan, and the Browns and Roberts. I have written about the McCluskeys, George W. Wright and Woods. Mr. Foote's wife and daughter died about 20 years ago. Mr. Sullivan had no family.

Mr. and Mrs. Brown and family have been residents of Birmingham for a number of years. Mr. Brown is a Detroit florist, and Mrs. Roberts have passed on. They were the parents of two girls. George Wright was a brother of William "Rusty" Wright, professional ball player. George Wright's wife was the former Miss Mitty Bagley, sister of the former Miss Gladys Bagley, who is now Mrs. Jessie Birch.

Mrs. Wright's second husband was a doctor named Mr. Beardslee. She and her sister, Jessie, reside at 4446 Park street, Birmingham. Her daughter, Mrs. Florence Wright Beltz, is the wife of James Claude Beltz, who they live at Springville, Mich. They are the parents of Robert, Mark Lee and an infant son. Their home is on Prospect street in Pontiac, Michigan. John is now employed by the Detroit Trawlers Co. There, son of Florence and Claude Beltz, died at the age of 18 years, in 1907.
