## The Kitchen Korner

"I wish I could think of something to do this year. I've done the same things with the same fruits over and over, and we don't even enjoy eating them any more." Mrs. S. . . complained as the weekly sewing group whiled the afternoon away with leisurely stitches.

"What do you mean by the same things?" the mother of the hostess smilingly inquired.

"Oh, strawberries, cherries, raspberries, peaches, pears, just what everybody else does at this time of year."

"I notice that you don't include gooseberries, have you? ever thought of spiced gooseberries?"

"That is something new—to me, at any rate. How do you make them, Mrs. R. . . ?"

"Oh, I have a very simple old-fashioned recipe. To every five pounds of fruit I use four of sugar. Then I add one part of vinegar and three tablespoons of ground spices, and cook it all together, slowly until it is thick. Seal it in glasses, as you would jam, and use whole spices instead of powdered ones, the color will be brighter. You see, when you drain off the liquid, it softens the cooking, and that too, preserves the natural color of tomatoes."

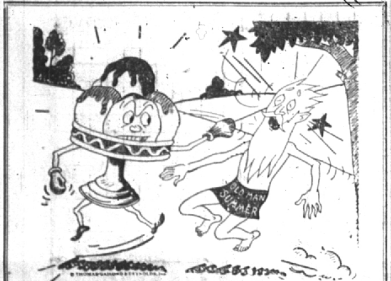
