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Famous Story of Arthurian Days To Be Enacted in Greek Theater

Few settings could be more ap-
propriate for an outdoor presen-
tation of Macfarlane's poetic dra-
ma, "Pelles and Meliande," than
the Greek Theater at Cranbrook,
the estate of Mr. and Mrs. George
G. Booth in Bloomfield Hills.

Artistically, as well as from the
standpoint of mechanical arrange-
ments, it will lend itself most ad-
equately Friday evening, when St.
Dunstan's Guild offers the play as
its annual outdoor production. The
performance will be public for all
who wish to see the dramatization
of one of the most famous ro-
mances of the colorful Arthurian
era.

Under Professional Direction
Although the cast is composed
of Guild members, the play will
be staged under the professional
direction of Kimon Fyiar of the
Detroit Federal Theater. Fyiar, re-
cently from New York where he directed
and participated in numerous dra-
matic productions. He is a former
student of Prof. George Pierce
Baker of Yale University.

Appearing in the title roles will
be Mrs. Pat Eden as Meliande and
Edwin Stephens as Pelles, whose
love endured many trials. Portray-
ing the three Fates, will be Mrs.
Donald Hight, Miss Linton Hart,
and Mrs. W. Hamilton Aulenbach.
Harry D. Hoy will be seen as
Golaud, half-brother of Pelles,
and grandson of Arkel, King of
Allennode.

and Golaud, will be enacted by

Booth will take the part of King
Arkel. Yniold, son of Golaud by a
former marriage, will be portrayed
by Marjorie Booth. John Sanders

of important arrangements as

George T. Nickerson as business
manager. Mrs. J. Robert F. Swan-
son is designing the costumes, and
Mrs. Marc T. Patten and William

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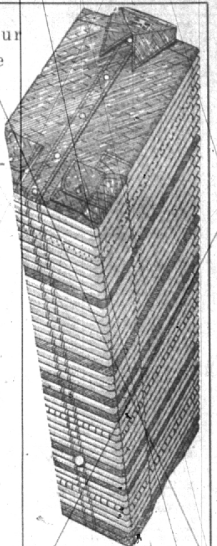
