Flower Show Blossoms Forth With Fine Display of Exhibits

Each year the flower show sponsored by the Birmingham unit of the Women's National Farm and Garden Association blossoms forth with greater beauty and in larger proportions. The show held Friday at the Community House was one of the finest staged, both in point of exhibitions and in the enthusiasm of those entering.

As an encouragement to flower-lovers in the community, open classes were included; so that non-members might try their skill in the art of floral arrangement. Children, too, were invited to submit exhibits, providing they were arranged without assistance.

The show numbered 312 exhibits, with 125 exhibitors. Mrs. Henry Porter of Bingham road won first prize with 18 points, based on the number of ribbons and merits. Mrs. M. S. Kice, Jr., of Glenayr road came second in honor with 16 points.

Exhibits Show Skill
Originality and artistic design characterized the show. One of the most notable exhibits was the large white, low bowl, in which three types of leaves were arranged by Mrs. Sam Garber to produce a most unusual and artistic effect. This bowl was among the winners of blue ribbons, as was that entered by Mrs. Harold R. Roehm.

In the latter, Mrs. Roehm arranged a row of blue ribbon bathelet buttons and snow in summer under glass and under water, by inverting the bowl. Mrs. Harry Denyes won a blue ribbon for her unique table arrangement in brown and white effect with yellow. Two small brass bowls filled with yellow rock garden buttercups and brown leaves were used as the floral decoration, around which were arranged six yellow china birds. The appointments were equally effective, with white plates, cups and saucers on brown place cards contrasting with amber glasses.

Mrs. D. Anderson won a blue ribbon for her lovely blue and white table as did Mrs. E. Caldwell, who skillfully combined a variety of colors. Mrs. Sheldon R. Noble and Mrs. James R. Mock were awarded red ribbons for their attractive tables.

Budget Tables Novel
A novel class that included the budget tables, the cost of which was not to exceed \$1.25 for arrangement. Mrs. Alan W. Johnson was awarded a blue ribbon for her table in brown and cream. In this class Mrs. Charles H. Welch, Jr., was awarded a red ribbon, and Mrs. Leigh Sharp and Mrs. W. S. Gilbreath, Jr., yellow ribbons for their attractive tables. Of the eight budget tables entered, Mrs. C. C. Hood also won a blue ribbon for her table in red and white, and Mrs. Atwood B. Outman was awarded a yellow ribbon for her artistic table.

Mrs. Clyde Hagerman arranged the lovely tea tables, which attracted comment among judges as well as guests. The tables were arranged in "T" formation, and in the center was an unusual device suggestive of Mexico. It consisted of a series of tiers or levels, banked with small pots of cactus and other plants from the same section of the country. At the base of the centerpiece, a stolid five-branched Mexican candleabra, placed on either side.
