

1938 HORSE SHOW IS ASSURED HERE

Detroit Association Picks Bloomfield Hunt Club Again For Event

Detroit will have a National Horse Show again next year. This was assured yesterday at the first meeting of the Detroit Horse Show Association following the popular event in Bloomfield Hills, June 4-5-6.

From every standpoint, especially that of public interest and attendance, the association regarded the 1937 show as a huge success—so much so, that the decision to sponsor a National Show here again next year was reached by acclamation.

The 1937 Show drew galleries from all walks and demonstrated that interest in fine horses is shared by thousands in all ages and stations.

Next year's show will be held early in June, between the Seelye (Pittsburgh) and Lake Forest (Chicago) Shows. Application is being made to the Bloomfield Open Hunt Club for use of the grounds for the 1938 National event.

A check of attendance at this year's Show revealed that more than twice as many people saw the 1937 event as ever before saw a

Detroit Horse Show. More than 20,000 attended this year as compared with less than 10,000 at the previous Show. This year saw 225 horses competing as against 80 last year. Entries, too, showed a big jump with 800 this year compared with 550 for last year.

At the same time the quality of the competition was of the highest grade, with many of the country's top flight performers contending in each of the Hunter, Jumper, Hackney and Saddle Horse divisions.

The nation-wide interest in the event was evidenced in the entries that came from Wisconsin, Illinois, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Indiana, Missouri, Michigan and Canada. In addition to the \$7,500.00 in cash prizes, winners took away twenty-five trophies and some three hundred and fifty ribbons.

One of the major trophies—the Dineen-Burnham Challenge trophy for ladies harness ponies—was retired this year when Mr. A. B. Dick, Jr., of Lake Forest topped the class for the third year with Melbourne.

To assure the success of the 1938 event and provide Detroit with another outstanding Horse Show, the Show Association is already making preparations for next year.

Cycle Race Honors Won By Local Man

Phil Dorach, 820 Purdy Street, won individual honors in the bicycle race sponsored Sunday at Belle Isle's athletic field, by the amateur Bicycle League of America.

Representing the Sunset Riders, who played hosts to the "East Side" Cycle Club, Dorach placed second in the three mile open, finishing behind George Omschuk, threat man of the invading team. An excited crowd witnessed a race of wit and skill, the sun as speed, which was evinced in sprints on the short straight-

aways. There were a number of jams resulting from these sprints, and one sensational spill in front of the stands, which brought spectators to their feet, though no one was seriously injured.

In the next event, the miles and, after a flashing burst of speed put Dorach ahead in the second lap,

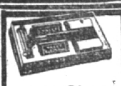
and kept him there to win first over Dave Dryburgh by two lengths. The principal of the race is that after the first lap the last man across the finish line is eliminated until there are only four riders left, who ride two more laps to finish. Not having completed nine last September, when he won the Maryland Championships and ven-

twanted that state in the National contest, Dorach's standing remains unimpaired after such a good showing in the best field of riders Detroit has seen for a long time in the amateur field.
