GUILD WILL STAGE STORY OF PELLEAS

Theme from Classics Chosen For Performance in Greek Theater

Maurice Masterlinek's lyrical classic, "Pelleas and Melisande," has been selected by St. Dunstan's Guild for its annual outdoor presentation to be staged Friday evening, June 18, at 8:30 o'clock in the Greek Theater at Cranbrook.

Summer's Guests Are Easily Entertained With Cold Plates of Meats and Salads

During the summer when one's friends are apt to drop in at any moment, every housekeeper should have hand all foods that will help her out in the kitchen. Try serving cold plates; arrange the plate in the kitchen and bring them to the table.

Cold Spiced Platter
Cut cold ham, tongue, or other meat, in thin delicate slices. Use a very sharp knife. Arrange in rows at either end of a large platter with slices overlapping. In the center put cups of crisp lettuce filled with marinated asparagus. Garnish with celery curls, sliced radishes, and wedge-shaped pieces of cheese sprinkled with paprika. Serve with sandwiches of rye bread and butter; for a relish use speed pears or pineapple.

Cold Plates
Arrange thin slices of cold liverwurst and corned beef at either end of a large platter with slices overlapping. In the center put cups of crisp lettuce filled with sliced radishes, potato and olive salad. Garnish with radish roses and large green olives.

Poached Peaches
Drain the juice from a can of halved peaches. Measure juice; add half as much sugar and cook until syrupy. Add one or two drops of almond extract. Cook peaches halves in syrup until thoroughly heated through. Place in a shallow serving dish, hollow side up; fill cavities with fresh raspberries or raspberry jam; and pour any remaining juice around them. Serve hot with cream cheese sauce.

Cream Cheese Sauce
Mash 1 cream cheese (3 ounces) with a fork. Add cream or milk gradually until soft and smooth; beat until fluffy. Serve like this or chill and serve like hard sauce.
