The Badington team of Baldwin played a group of matches with Northwood at Northwood. Baldwin dropped all matches except two.

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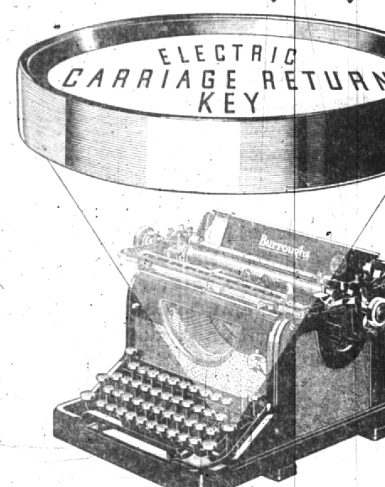
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
