Music lovers of Birmingham will be given an opportunity to hear Jackie Rees, noted English boy soprano, in a song recital Tuesday evening, March 20, at St. James' Episcopal church, under auspices of Mr. James Chubb, 25 N. 10th.

The child, who is 12 years old, was born in the town of Louisa, in Wales, near Swansea, where he attended school. He has sung in Cathedral and Churches in both England and Wales from an early age. His voice was recognized, and he entered the Chapel Royal, to which only a select few are admitted on scholarship.

He has won for two consecutive years of the National Eisteddfod, and gave a command performance before the late King George V in 1925. He sang the following year for the former King Edward VIII. He is the winner of more than 200 prizes, cups and medals.

Garden Unit Sponsors Move To Protect Wild Flowers In State

This is the time of year when so-called "nature lovers" feel the urge to go out in the woods and pick wild flowers, with the result that numerous varieties are in danger of extermination.

To prevent further destruction of wild blooms, members of the educational committee of the Birmingham Branch of the Women's National Farm and Garden Association, met Monday to consider the matter following luncheon at the Foxland House. In the group were Mrs. William McAlhally, chairman; Mrs. Draper Albee, Mrs. Hiram Perry Holmes, Mrs. Edward A. Robin and Mrs. Harry Dwyer.

The fact that in the spring each year wild flowers are picked and dug up in such numbers as to endanger their propagation, is a matter of concern to those interested in conservation.

In order to protect scarce varieties the education committee decided to inform the public as to which flowers may be picked, and which should be protected.

The committee agreed that as nine-tenths of the wild flowers picked, dug up, etc., and therefore benefit no one, an appeal should be made to flower lovers to cooperate in the present program of conservation. This program is stated in a bill now being formulated, and sponsored by a group of the horticultural organizations of the state.

At the meeting of the Birmingham unit to be held April 12 at the Community House at 2 p. m., Prof. George Gould Ross of the University of Michigan will speak on "Color and Design in the Small Garden." He will illustrate his talk with slides.

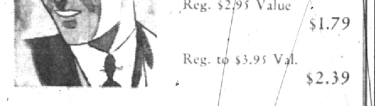
