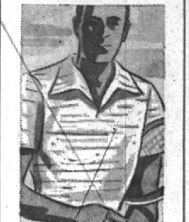
MUSICALE PLANS ANNUAL LUNCHEON

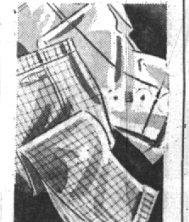
