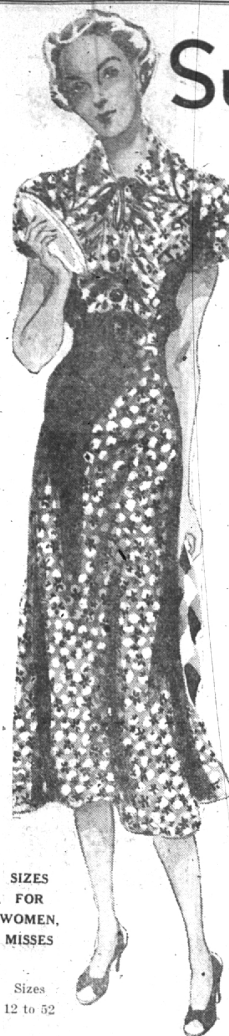
table, at which Mrs. Victor Ogden, president of the society, will pour.

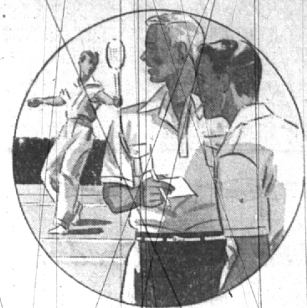
