You Never Can Sometimes Maybe Ever Tell Just What Will Win A Soup Recipe Prize

Mrs. Percy Denean, of East Lincoln Avenue, winner of the \$10.00 prize offered by The Eccentric for the best vegetable soup recipe, didn't submit her entry to the contest in hopes of winning a prize. It wasn't that she doubted the potency of her soup, but, as she said, she had never won anything in her life before.

This is the recipe which won the prize for Mrs. Denean.

Boil a rich soup bone over a very slow fire for two hours. Be sure you have two quarts of liquid left. Then run the following vegetables through a coarse grinder, and salt and pepper to taste.

One cup carrots,
One cup cabbage,
One cup potatoes,
One-half cup onions,
Two cups cooked tomatoes,
One teaspoon celery seeds,
Four bay leaves.
Add the vegetables and seasonings to the liquid and let boil again

for one hour. This will serve eight people.

"I don't exactly know where this recipe originated," confessed Mrs. Denean, "but I started out with the base for it about twenty years ago. For a long while I jiggled the ingredients around, adding things or taking them away. Finally, with the addition of the bay leaves, I knew I had a recipe which I'd want to keep."

"Often when I've made more of this soup than I needed for my family, I've taken some over to the neighbors, and they all rave over it. In fact, no matter where I've made this soup, everyone has thought it was wonderful."

Judges in the contest, Mrs. Clinton Sears and Mrs. Melvin C. Hart, based their decision on a stiff set of qualifications. Having met all of them successfully, anyone who wants to try Mrs. Denean's soup may be sure that it is the best, in Birmingham from the standpoint of economy, simplicity, ease of preparation, content and nourishment.
