Spring Formal To Be Held At House

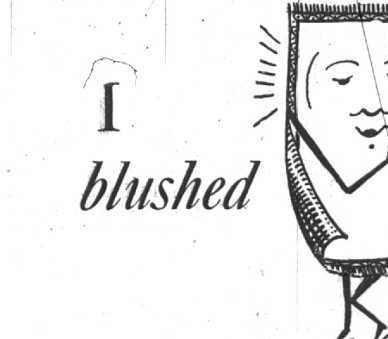
The annual Spring Formal given at the Community House each year by those attending the regular Saturday Night Dances will be held Saturday evening of this week. It will be the last dance of the season.
