## Sweet Potatoes Offer Wide Variety Of Tempting Recipes For Fall Menus

Sweet potatoes offer a wide variety of tempting recipes for fall menus. They can be used for breakfast, dinner or supper; try sautéed potatoes with your breakfast bacon. A baked potato is the simplest way to serve them. Bake the potatoes in the oven for an hour or longer. Serve hot with butter.

Candied Sweet Potatoes & Apples  
4 medium sweet potatoes.  
2 large tart apples.  
1/2 cup brown sugar.  
1/2 cup chopped nuts.  
5 tablespoons butter.  
1/2 cup buttered bread crumbs.  
Arrange alternate layers of the sliced apples (cores removed) and sliced sweet potatoes in a greased baking dish. Sprinkle each layer with the sugar and nuts, and dot with butter. Cover and bake in a shallow pan for 45 minutes or until the apples are soft. Remove the cover, sprinkle with the bread crumbs and bake until crumbs are brown.

Stuffed Yams  
3 large yams.  
4 tablespoons butter.  
1 teaspoon salt.  
1/2 cup sautéed cream.  
Wash yams, brush with melted butter and bake in an oven 450 degrees until soft. Cut in half, remove centers and put through a potato ricer. Add 3 tablespoons of butter, salt and cream. Beat until light. Return mixture to 4 of the shells, sprinkle each with 2 tablespoons of brown sugar, dot with remaining butter. Bake in oven until sugar is melted.

Candied Sweet Potatoes  
6 medium sweet potatoes.  
1/2 cup water.  
1 cup brown sugar.  
1/2 teaspoon salt.  
1/2 cup melted butter.  
1/2 cup pecans.  
Marshmallows.  
Wash and boil sweet potatoes until tender. Drain, peel and cut in lengthwise slices. Arrange in a shallow baking dish. Squeeze juice of 1/2 orange over potatoes; then sprinkle the peas and arrange the other half of orange cut in slices around the potatoes. Sprinkle with melted butter and a syrup made by cooking the brown sugar and water together for 5 minutes. Sprinkle with salt and bake 1 hour in an oven 350 degrees. When ready to serve cover with marshmallows and put back in oven until marshmallows are brown.

Sweet Potato Waffles  
1/2 cup melted fat.  
2 tablespoons sugar.  
3 eggs.  
1 cup milk.  
1/2 cup mashed sweet potatoes.  
1 cup mashed sweet potatoes.  
2 tablespoons baking powder.  
1/2 cup brown sugar.  
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon.  
Cream fat with sugar, stir in well beaten egg yolks and add to the mixture. Fold in sifted beaten egg whites. Bake in a heated waffle iron until golden brown. Serve with fruit chicken.

Sweet Potato Soufflé  
6 medium sweet potatoes.  
Parsley—salt.  
1/2 teaspoon pepper.  
3 slices of bacon.  
Cook the potatoes until tender and mash well. Add the salt, pepper and 3 tablespoons melted fat. When cool enough to handle form into round balls 2 inches in diameter. Sprinkle with chopped bacon, brush with melted butter and brown in an oven 375 degrees for 12 minutes. Garnish with parsley.

Fried Sweet Potatoes  
Select large potatoes, peel and slice in half inch slices. Put a small amount of grease into a frying pan. Have medium hot, place slices in pan and fry to a medium brown. Keep pan covered to create steam. Sprinkle with sugar.

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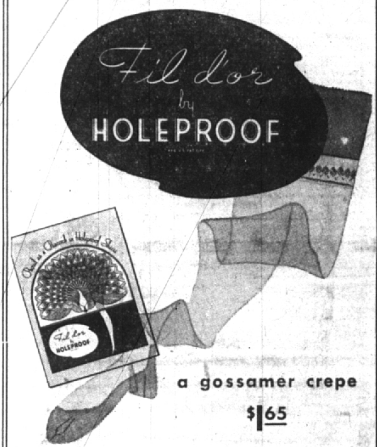
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
