### Dr. Wood To Attend State Convention

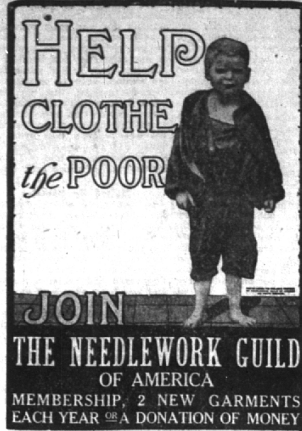
Dr. John P. Wood, 212 Wabek Bligg, Birmingham, who is a trustee of the Michigan Osteopathic Association of Physicians and Surgeons, will be active in the business sessions of that organization at its 36th annual convention in Grand Rapids, Oct. 26 to 28.

Michigan was among the early states in which osteopathy was established, a law governing its practice in Michigan being enacted, and signed before there was an osteopathic physician located in the state.

When the law was passed on April 21, 1897, Dr. Samuel Landis, of Chicago, who had made frequent trips to Lansing to assist in the passage of the bill, remained in Michigan as the first osteopathic physician to locate in the state, and established a practice at Grand Rapids, this year's convention city. Within five years, enough osteopathic physicians had located in the state to organize the Michigan association which has been functioning ever since.

An attendance of 400 or more is expected at this year's meeting.

### Breakfast Is Not The Only Time For Tempting Dishes Made From Cereals

Wheat, corn, oats and rice are the most important cereals today. They range high in nutritive value and are among the cheapest of energy-producing foods. Breakfast is the main time for cereals, but there are many ways of using them in the other meals of the day.

- Cereal Ring**
  - 1-2 cup cooked wheat cereal
  - 8 cups clear chicken broth
  - 6 eggs
  - 1-2 teaspoon salt
  - 2 green peppers, chopped fine
  - Put boiling chicken broth in double boiler. Slowly add the cereal and salt, stirring until it begins to thicken. Cook for 1 hour.
  - Put in a mixing bowl. Stir in unbeaten egg yolks one at a time. Beat thoroughly, add green pepper. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites.
- Scalloped Tuna Fish**
  - 2 cups shredded Tuna fish
  - 2 tablespoons melted butter or butter substitute
  - 2 shredded wheat biscuit
  - 1-1/2 cups medium white sauce
  - Paprika
  - Arrange alternate layers of tuna fish and white sauce in a well-greased baking dish. Sprinkle with crumbled wheat biscuit. Add butter. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake in an oven 425 degrees for twenty minutes.
- Cornflake Cakes**
  - 1 cup corn flakes
  - 1-4 cup candied cherries (chopped fine)
  - 1 egg white
  - 1-4 teaspoon salt
  - 1-4 cup sugar
  - 1-4 cup milk
  - 2 teaspoons shredded coconut
  - 1-4 teaspoon orange flavoring
  - Add the salt to the egg white and beat until stiff, but not dry. Continue beating and add the sugar. Fold in the corn flakes, mixed with the cherries, nuts and coconut. Add the flavoring and stir until all the ingredients are well-blended. Divide the mixture into 12 portions and shape into bars with wet fingers. Place on a greased cookie sheet and bake in an oven 375 degrees for 10 minutes.
