

**Ted Shawn Dancers
At Masonic Temple
Friday, November 12**

Ted Shawn and His Men Dancers, that spectacular dance ensemble of young Apollos, brings the crowning achievement of Shawn's career to Detroit this fall. "O, Libertad," an American Saga in Three Acts, comes to Masonic Auditorium Friday evening, November 12.

This special dance presentation, under the joint auspices of the Wednesday Town Hall and the Women's City Club, combines thrilling drama, spectacular costumes and magnificent dancing in a dramatic dance program unlike anything previously seen in America.

Shawn, America's greatest male dancer and choreographer, spends time and history in three acts. ACT I, THE PAST, encompasses the Spanish invaders, the missionaries, the Aztec emperor, the gold rush. 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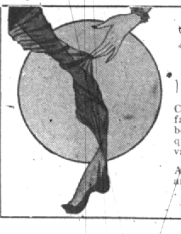
