CRANBROOK '11 WIN GRID FRAY

After Three Early Season Defeats, Team Shows Fighting Spirit

Stung by the memory of three early season defeats, and bolstered by the addition of two hard driving backs to the lineup, the Cranbrook School eleven decisively defeated Western Reserve Academy, of Hudson, O., 19 to 0, at the Bloomfield Hills field Saturday afternoon.

In the third quarter Miller smothered a Reserve threat by intercepting an enemy pass in his own territory and running 65 yards through a broken field for a score. Crosthwaite's kick was blocked. Again in the fourth, after a series of successful ground plays, Crosthwaite ran off tackle for 10 yards, crossing the goal line standing up. Dick Morgan's attempt at conversion from place-

ment was good and ended the scoring for the afternoon.

Western Reserve, with 5 first downs to the opponent's 12, never seriously threatened the Cranbrook goal. Occasionally resorting to a diversified aerial attack of laterals and forward passes, the Ohio offense was a source of potential danger. But this attack, attempted on a cold day making ball handling difficult, frequently resulted into costly fumbles and interceptions.
