FORBID TRANSPORTING LOADED RIFLES, GUNS

LANSING, Oct. 10.—Loaded shotguns or rifles may not legally be kept or transported in or on an automobile under Michigan hunting laws at any time, reminds the department of conservation.

The reminder is given to all sportmen who wish to keep within the law during the fall hunting season. It is not legal for a hunter to stand or ride on the running board of his car with a loaded shotgun or rifle.

The law states that hunting guns should be unloaded both in the magazine and in the barrel when placed or carried in or on an automobile.

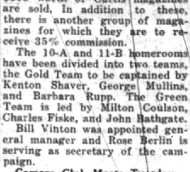
