

# CRANES START GRID PRACTICE

### Fifty Aspirants Report For Training Under Coach E. E. Raymond

Fifty hopefuls reported for the pre-season football practice at Cranbrook School, Bloomfield Hills on the starting day, and this number is being augmented daily as boys from more distant parts are heeding the call of Coach E. E. Raymond.

The initial check-up reveals an over-abundance of back-field men. Replacements of last year's line is the first major problem confronting the coach. Graduation toll took 12 lettermen, and the illness of Dick Wallace, Bloomfield Hills, last year's center, makes the line question even more acute. Dick will not out for the season.

The lettermen who will form the mainstay for this season's eleven are: Dick Morgan and George Wolf of Detroit, Ed Larchen and Jack Pierce of Bloomfield Hills, and Woodward Row of Lansing. Men who have seen service with Cranbrook's junior-varsity, and who are expected to make regular berths with the varsity include: Bill MacLachlan and Bill Meade of Detroit, Jack Pierce and John Hinshaw of Bloomfield Hills, Carl Holden, Lansing, Noble Lawson, Highland Park, and Henry Uihlein, Milwaukee.

The new men showing unusual promise include: Harold Miller, Royal Oak; Duane Crowl, Detroit; Cornelius Van Halteren, East Lansing; Edward Andrew, Ypsilanti; and Bob Rosewald, Philadelphia.

This will be Coach Raymond's third year as mentor at Cranbrook. There has been noticeable improvement in the squads of the past two years, and Cranbrook fans are hopeful despite the largely green set up and tough schedule ahead.

The cranes have their first engagement at home against Walled Lake, September 25, after which they will meet Birmingham High at Birmingham. The latter game will see the traditional rivals of the cranes out to avenge the Cranbrook victory of 1936.

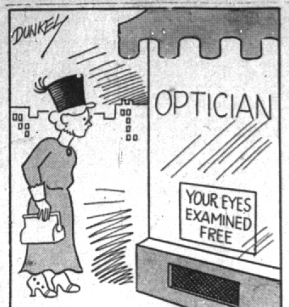

## BIG BEAVER HAS 451 ENROLLMENT

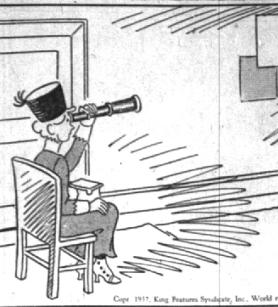
### Supt. Of Schools S. K. Baker Reports Facilities Are Taxed

With the present enrollment of 451 students, the Big Beaver school is taxed to capacity, according to Superintendent S. K. Baker. The school opened on September 8, and additional pupils registered every day, as more families are forced by the high rents in Detroit to move to the suburban area.

Mr. Baker further announced that, under the provisions of the National Youth Administration Act, funds will be available to certain students upon proper application through some recognized channel. He has made such application for a small number of students and, if plans go through, the funds will become available in a short time.

A Safety Patrol has been organized for the first time in the school's history, under the supervision of the American Automobile Association. Calculated to decrease the number of accidents involving school children, membership in the patrol is considered a high honor and is contingent upon good citizenship and high scholarship. At a meeting of the boys so honored, which was held Monday afternoon, Stanley Nancarrow was elected Patrol Captain and William Penney was elected to serve as Lieutenant.

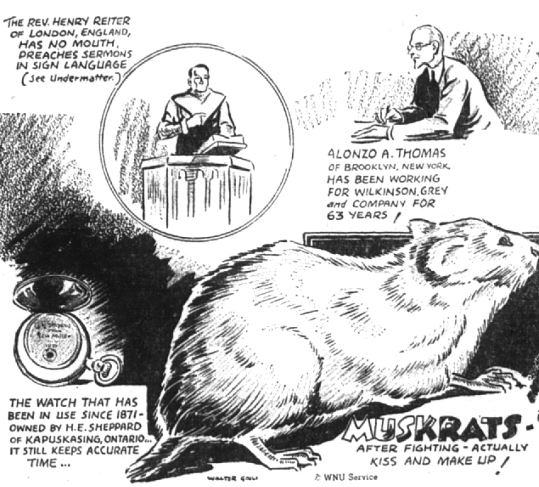


## Hills School Has Largest Enrollment

## NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING ON SPECIAL ASSESSMENT

Notice is hereby given by Resolution No. 283 adopted by the City Commission, on the 20th day of August, 1937, that a public hearing is to be held in the Commission Room of the Municipal Building on Monday, September 27th, at 8 o'clock P. M. to hear suggestions and objections to a proposed special assessment district, created to defray the cost of the construction of sewers on the New Michigan State Right-of-Way, which is to be utilized for the Detroit-Post Road Cut-off through the City of Birmingham, from Main Avenue in the northern city limits.

The City Manager has prepared estimates for this work, totaling \$18,241.88, of which \$1,237.35 is to be paid by the State, and \$16,994.53 is to be paid by the City of Birmingham. \$2,516.55 will be paid by the City at large, and \$14,478.00 will be paid by sewerage. The estimated cost per linear ft. will be \$1.44 for abutting property, and \$1.51 per 100 sq. ft. for drainage benefits to the district.

The area to be included in this assessment district is described as follows: Wilmington Avenue, Adams Road, Maple Avenue, Woodward Avenue, and more specifically defined in the map in the office of the City Engineering Department.
