Insects that many housewives know—to their sorrow—but can name are on display in the Michigan Insect Zoo in Convention Hall, Detroit.

What's more important, information on how to get rid of them accompanies each display.

Among the household insects are such tiny creatures as the silverfish, the speedy little bug that feeds on the backs of old books and piles of paper, the buffalo long, foe of woolen clothes; and the bed-bug, enemy of man. Others such as cockroaches and house centipedes are included in the display also.

Because of their diminutive size, most of the household insects are "caged" in small metal boxes with glass tops and keys to the Zoo may pick them up and examine them at close range.
