Looky what we got—we got a lot of new recordings at Sells, as many in fact that it's practically impossible to list all of 'em and do right by 'em. However, here are a few you ought to know about.

No less than Bunny Berigan's boys take up the cudgels on behalf of dear old Victor. The tune is "Mahogany Hall Stomp." But what's it like? I hear you snarling: Well, mit such guys as Peasner, Wetling and Fishkind, what would you expect? That's right, it's plenty hot and no more sensational than it'll be and do right by 'em. However, here are a few you ought to know about.

Also for Victor there plays another Goodman alum—Lionel Hampton. "Summertime" in his story, and it's fast—but fast. It features his vibraphone, on which he plays straight vibraphone stuff—exactly. On the other side is "Swing Guitars," rendered by—don't laugh, this is the real McCoy—the Quintette of the Hot Club of France. For no good reason the start and finish are handled by the fiddle and most piercing violin you ever heard. If you're a big sucker for guitars as I, you'll go mad over the rest of it, which is in the groove from here to town.

Massa Jimmy Dorsey, who never does anything but improve, is in the Decca league now, offering "The Moon Got in My Eyes," which is from that oh-so-cute show "Double or Nothing." For a change it's a slow and sweet number, with a vocalist who knows his stuff. "All You Wanna Do Is Dance" is on the other side and, if nothing else, the silliest and most piercing violin you ever heard, all tooting like mad, in a wacky explosion you alligators will enjoy. "All God's Chillun Got Rhythm," on the other side, proves that Dorsey has it, in any case. There's a fast, sustained tempo with plenty of clarinet and good interludes on bass fiddle and piano.

### The BOOK SHELF

Late Book Reviews and Literary Criticism

If you have not already heard about Clyde Brion Davis' "The Anointed" you will soon for it is fast becoming a summer favorite. Mr. Davis experienced considerable difficulty in selling his story. First of all he sent it to a prominent literary agent who rejected it. Next he started in on the publishers; the first one returned it after keeping it for several months and the second turned it down flat on the grounds that it had no humor! (We think the proof-reader must have suffered from indigestion.) It was then sent to Farrar and Rinehart who immediately made it a choice of "The Discoverers." "The Anointed" has a quality of humor second to none since Ring Lardner and if you don't read it you are going to miss a lot of fun.

The Harper Prize Novel for 1937 is Frederic Prohaska's "The Seven Who Fleed." And no small prize either—\$7500. The 28-year-old author already has two other successful novels to his credit and

when the judges, Sinclair Lewis, Louis Bromfield, and Thornton Wilder made their selection many critics felt that this year's choice was by far the most unusual. There have been eight Harper prizes awarded thus far; Julian Green's "The Dark Journey," Anne Paul's "The Precambrian," E. V. Rieu's "The Abbe McLaughlin" and H. L. Davis' "Home in the Horn" are among those chosen in previous years.

Donald Robert Perry Marquis, born in Walnut, Illinois July 29, 1878 during an eclipse of the sun and still looking, at 58 for something unusual to happen to him because of it—was recently awarded the Mark Twain Medal for his outstanding contributions to American humor during the past quarter century.

Don Marquis, as he is known to us, is described by Christopher Morley, as burly, gray-headed, fond of corn cob pipes and sausages. His most widely read books are those in which Archy, Mehitabel, and the Old Soak appear.

Will emphasize again, the excellence of that beautifully tender little story, "They Came Like Swallows" influence you to read it? It is one of the season's best.

On Sunday, August 29, William Lyon Phelps of Yale University, who summers near Bad Axe, Michigan, gave his annual message to the people of the community. Among the thirty best books of the past season, according to his opinion, are "Shining Sabard" by R. C. Hitchcock, "Bulwark of the Republic" by Brooks J. Hendrick and VanWey Books, "The Flowering of New England" and "Present Indicative" by Noel Coward.
