LENT TO CLOSE WITH SPECIAL MUSIC, PRAYER

The Rev. Theodore Wuggezer, Jr., pastor of Redeemer Lutheran church, announces the order of services with which his church will observe the closing days of Lent, and the advent of Easter Sunday. Beginning today, "Maundy Thursday" services will be held at 8 p. m., with Holy Communion, when members of the Confirmation Class, including four adults and four children, received their First Communion.

Festival of Resurrection Will Convey Belief In Eternity At Christ Church

Meditations on the Crucifixion and the singing of Stainer's Cantata, "The Crucifixion" by the adult choir will mark the observance of Good Friday at Christ Church Cranbrook, as part of the annual Three Hour Service.

Two early morning services on Easter Sunday will begin the worship of the day. The first celebration of Holy Communion will be at 6 o'clock in the Chapel of the Resurrection, followed by the Sunrise Service at 7 o'clock. This service will include a celebration of Holy Communion and special Easter music.

The Festival of the Resurrection, a service for children and their parents, will be presented at 9 o'clock. The Festival is a pageant interpreting the Easter theme, and includes a pilgrimage of the entire congregation to the tomb, which will be erected in one of the chapels. Here, to convey the message of life growing out of the tomb, a fresh flower will be presented to each of the children. At 11 a. m., there will be another celebration of Holy Communion, followed by the Easter service and special music.

A Vesper Service at 4 p. m. will close the day's observance. The service will include an organ recital by August Richard Mackelbergh, which will open with Bach's "Vivallid Concerto in G." This selection will be followed by "Allegro Cantabile from the Fifth Symphony" by Widor. An original
