Carrots Served In A Variety Of Tasty Dishes Are Beneficial To Your Health

"If you want to be pretty, eat carrots," how often we hear this remark? There is a good deal of truth in this saying, as carrots contain many good qualities that have a direct bearing on good health. Many delicious dishes may be prepared by combining carrots with other vegetables. Try the following and see for yourself:

- Carrot and Mushroom Loaf 1 cup milk 3 tablespoons shortening 3 tablespoons flour 1/4 teaspoon white pepper 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 cup cooked diced carrots 1/2 cup cooked diced mushrooms 4 eggs

This loaf is made by combining the ingredients in a bowl and mixing thoroughly. Bake in a greased loaf pan for 1 hour. Make a cream sauce of the first five ingredients; cool slightly before pouring over the loaf. Sprinkle with grated cheese and serve hot.

- Carrots and String Beans au Gratin 3 cups sliced string beans 3 cups sliced cooked carrots 2 tablespoons fat or margarine 1 small onion minced 3 tablespoons flour 1/2 cup soft bread crumbs 2 1/2 cups milk 1 teaspoon salt 1 cup grated American cheese 2 eggs beaten slightly

Prepare the string beans and carrots; add the minced onion and cook it until tender. Then add the flour and stir until smooth. Next, add the milk, salt, pepper and cheese, and continue cooking while stirring constantly, until the sauce is thickened. Remove from the heat and pour it over the beans, bread crumbs, and cheese. Bake in a greased casserole top with the breadcrumbs which have been brushed. Bake in an oven 350 degrees until just 30 minutes.

- Creole Carrots Cook young carrots in boiling salted water until tender but soft, remove seeds and fibre from a green pepper. Cut carrots, pepper and aimento in thin strips. Heat a little fat in frying pan, add carrots and green pepper and cook slowly 10 minutes. Do not brown. Add pimento and salt and pepper to taste. Mix well. When ready to serve sprinkle with chopped parsley.

- Carrot and Celery Salad With Peanut Dressing Cut cold cooked carrots in thin strips and mix with an equal quantity of crisp celery, cut in small pieces. Serve on lettuce with peanut dressing, made by whipping 4 tablespoons of peanut butter into 1 cup cooked salad dressing.

- Carrot Timbales 1/2 cup bread crumbs 1/2 cup milk 2 tablespoons butter 1/2 teaspoon sugar 1 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon parsley 2 eggs 1 1/2 cups grated carrot

Cook bread crumbs and milk until thickened. Add butter, sugar, salt, pepper, and parsley. Beat eggs until light and add with the grated carrot to first mixture. Turn into greased molds. Place molds in a shallow pan and fill pan with hot water to within 1 inch of the top of the molds. Bake in an oven 325 degrees until firm. As soon as they are done, they are removed from the pan of water, a small pointed knife is slipped around the edge and they are inverted on a hot serving dish. They should slip out easily, but if they hesitate, just tap the mold gently on bottom and sides. Pour creamed peas over and around them.
