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# College Knowledge

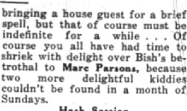

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# ORDINANCE No. 239 AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE No. 104

The City of Birmingham Ordains:  
That Section 15 of Article VII of Ordinance No. 104 of the Ordinances of the City of Birmingham be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 15—SEPTIC TANKS, CESS POOLS AND DRY CLOSETS  
(a) The building of septic tanks, cess pools, or dry closets, or the use of any form of chemical closet is prohibited where access may be had to a sanitary or storm sewer.  
(b) Septic tanks, if permitted, shall be constructed of brick, concrete or cement blocks and have at least two compartments not less than three (3) feet square by three (3) feet deep. Such tank shall be made water tight, have a concrete floor not less than three (3) inches thick and a concrete cover provided with iron manholes for cleaning out each compartment.  
(c) Where neither sanitary nor storm sewer is available, the use of cess pools, septic tanks, or chemical toilets may be permitted; this is, however, a matter entirely within the discretion of the plumbing inspector, and if permitted, all construction shall be in accordance with regulations of this section, and be approved by the plumbing inspector.

All provisions of the said Section 15 of Article VII of Ordinance No. 104 are hereby repealed.  
This ordinance shall take effect immediately after the passage and upon publication thereof.
