Leading variety in the selections will be the next group for the organ. Mr. Rivette will play "Kannest Du Gedenken" by Rubenstein, "La Fille Aux Cheveux De Lin" by Debussy and the first movement of Schubert's "Unfinished Symphony." Mr. Sobe's next song will be Schubert's "Marriage," followed by "Ave Maria" and "The Lord Is A Green Hill Far Away." The concluding triple group will be "Lob-Stramm," "Air for G. Steing," by Bach and "To A Good Home," by MacDowell.

Mr. Sobe's concluding song will be "Gloria-Pocoia." The final soloist is "Rosaria and Pique in D Minor," by Bach, played by Mr. Rivette. During the Benediction, Mr. Rivette will play "O Salutaris," "Pans Angelicus," and "Tantum Ergo."

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Most of us know our cooking has gotten in a rut. But we can shake our consciences by thinking that our menus are costly, take too much time and the family probably wouldn't like it anyway. So we keep right on scrambling eggs, frying steak and taking puddings. A simple, yet different menu, perfectly prepared and charmingly served, will take the monotony out of cooking and will make the family feel proud of its housekeeper.

- Corn Turnovers** - 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup butter, 1/2 cup cornmeal, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup raisins, 1/2 cup currants, 1/2 cup nuts, 1/2 cup apples.
- Creamed Tomatoes and Cheese** - 4 tablespoons fat, 1 1/2 cups milk, 1 teaspoon salt, 6 slices buttered toast.
- Potatoes** - 4 tablespoons grated cheese, 3 hard boiled eggs, Parsley.
- Wash, steam and cut the tomatoes in halves crosswise. Dip in seasoned flour, then saute in the hot fat until golden brown on both sides. Arrange on the toast in the center of a platter. Then add the four to the fat left in the skillet, stir until smooth, then add the milk gradually, the salt and pepper and the grated cheese. Cool gently, stirring until smooth. Add the eggs which have been sliced. When thoroughly mixed, cover with the tomatoes. Garnish with parsley.**
- Liver and Vegetable in Casserole** - 1 pound liver, Pepper, 1/2 cup onion, 2 cups potatoes, 2 cups carrots, 2 cups peas, 1/2 cup butter, 1/2 cup flour, 1/2 cup salt.
- Tuna Fish and Green Pea Salad** - 1 can tuna fish, 2 cups green peas, 1/2 cup mayonnaise, 1/2 cup chopped stuffed olives, 1/2 cup sliced mushrooms, 1/2 cup sliced celery, 1/2 cup sliced onion, 1/2 cup sliced carrot, 1/2 cup sliced tomato, 1/2 cup sliced cucumber, 1/2 cup sliced radish, 1/2 cup sliced carrot, 1/2 cup sliced tomato, 1/2 cup sliced cucumber, 1/2 cup sliced radish.
